

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

The Gloucestershire Association of Boys' Clubs comprises twenty-five Boys' Clubs in the County and two in Hereford, all of which are affiliated to the National Association of Boys' Clubs.

Total affiliations would appear to be somewhat less than last year because Clubs previously shown as in abeyance are no longer carried on our list, which now represents a live and active membership. We are glad to include and welcome two newly affiliated Clubs, Dursley and Tewkesbury Swifts.

The Organising Secretary serves on the Management Committees of most Clubs and is always available to advise and help whenever necessary. He maintains a friendly contact with all affiliated Clubs, which he visits regularly, and it is this service which is one of the most important facets of the work of the Association.

The Executive Committee is in close and constant touch with the National Association through their Chairman, who is a member of the N.A.B.C. Council and also a member of its Executive Committee, and through the Secretary who is a member of the Advisory and Regional Committees. Similar contact is maintained with the following Committees through the Secretary, who also maintains close and friendly contact with the County and City Youth Services through their Youth Officers:—

DEVELOPMENT OF NEW CLUBS

Continued development is very much in the mind of the Executive Committee and during the past year a new Club has with local help been opened at Tewkesbury where already the members are working towards provision of their own building. Progress at Bishop's Cleeve has been retarded, but erection of the new building is nearly complete and another month should see it ready for occupation. The Management Committee are making every effort to start the Club free from debt, and a very great measure of help is being given in this direction by local residents. This Club will be opened on Thursday, September 18th, 1958, probably at 7 p m., by our President, His Grace The Duke of Beaufort.

Preparatory development work is being carried on in the Tetbury area in the south of the County and in the Forest of Dean in the west, whilst further north long held plans for the Ashchurch area look like bearing fruit.

Running side by side with normal development, help has been given in a number of areas where existing though non-affiliated Clubs have been attracted by the Association's activities, and it is anticipated that applications for affiliation will shortly be received from Clubs in Cheltenham, Lower Tuffley, Wickwar and Tewkesbury.

TRAINING AND ADVENTURE

Mobile Training Wing

The Mobile Training Wing of the N.A.B.C. visited the County in November and two Training Sessions were held, one in Cheltenham for Clubs in the north of the County and one in Stroud for Clubs in that area. Invitation to these sessions was extended to interested people outside the movement as well as to our own Leaders. Support in Cheltenham came mainly from Leaders and attendance was good, but the greatest success came in the Stroud area where public support brought many new friends into contact with local Clubs and with the Association.

Senior Boy Training

Three Senior Boy Training Courses were held at the Beverstone Centre in January, March and April, when, as an experiment, Club members were invited to take part in a progressive programme of training and adventure. Although each Course was planned as an entity, it was hoped that members would attend all three if they were to gain full benefit. The result was encouraging and an average of twenty-six boys from some ten Clubs, together with four Leaders, attended each week-end. Although the main emphasis was on Club work, wider interests were encouraged, and visiting experts gave sessions on Lightweight Camping, Canoeing, Pot-holing, Climbing, and the Fitness Charter. A night adventure was included each week-end, and the final Course found students taking the responsibility of organising one full day's activities.

Adjustment to Industry Courses

Five Adjustment to Industry Courses have been held during the

year and all were fully booked.

These courses, which are residential and last for five days, aim at developing a right attitude to work in the minds of boys between 15 and 18 years of age, nearly all apprentices, by giving them a proper understanding of the history, organisation, and economics of Industry.

The Committee is particularly grateful to Dowty Equipment Limited, to the Royal Army Educational Corps and to the Royal Navy, who are now providing one tutor each for each successive course.

National Boys' Club

Michael Shill of Cirencester attended a National Boys' Club Candidates' Week at St. Pierre and, having proved himself worthy, was elected to membership of the National Boys' Club which, since it was instituted in 1951, has given special recognition to boys whose service to their own Club is outstanding. Five more candidates have been accepted for Candidates' Weeks to be held later this year.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

Last year two Clubs, Whaddon and College Boys' Club and Nailsworth Boys' Club, took part in the Pilot Scheme of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme, and seven members of the Nailsworth Club have already passed for their Bronze Standard and have recently completed the major part of the work for the Silver Award.

For the coming year ten Clubs have indicated they have members interested in the Scheme and an ad hoc Committee of Leaders of participating Clubs has been formed to co-operate in the working of the Scheme and to ensure that Clubs as well as members taking part shall benefit from the new and interesting people who will of necessity be called in to help. On the pursuits side in particular will the goodwill and help of many people as yet outside the movement be sought, experts in their own sphere who, by taking an interest in perhaps only one boy, will bring new life and new ideas within reach.

Camping

Now that the days of the static camp have almost gone, many small groups of boys are making use of lightweight equipment to go further and further afield. Clubs have made many calls on both the N.A.B.C. and the Education Authority's equipment, whilst in a number of cases both Clubs and boys are now making special efforts to obtain their own. Projects are almost always a feature of these expeditions and a new interest is being aroused in our own countryside.

Service to Others

The Committee is particularly pleased with the growth of Public Service amongst our Clubs and it is encouraging to find

Members visiting and welcoming to their Clubs children deprived of normal home life.

Groups of boys adopting local hospitals and playing games with the children there.

Boys with some skills offering their services to Old Age Pensioners. Perhaps a special mention may be made of the fifteen boys and three Leaders who, in the appalling weather conditions of last winter, spent their week-ends high on a lonely mountainside, reconditioning two very derelict cottages—recently given to Nash Court, the N.A.B.C. Camping and Training Centre—so that a "Mountain Headquarters" is now established not only for Gloucestershire boys but for boys from Clubs in any part of the country.

Whilst service to others brings its own reward, one Club found double benefits when, for helping a contractor to demolish three old cottages, they were given the bricks; and they anticipate that by the time they have disposed of 4,000 their building fund for their own Clubroom will have grown by nearly £200.

CLUB WEEK

No external signs distinguish the Club member from his fellows, but the work he does for his Club, for himself and for others is no less real for that, and special mention must be made of all the work undertaken during the Annual Club Week.

This is a special week when members do all they can to raise funds for their Club, for their County Association and for the National Association. Seventy per cent of the money raised goes into Club funds and the remaining thirty per cent is divided equally between the two Associations.

Last year a record of £650 was raised and Clubs were justly proud of this result. This year this total was again exceeded when, by their own efforts, members raised over £700.

The G.A.B.C. were represented at the Club Week Opening Ceremony by the Chairman, the Secretary and four Club boys. Loyal messages from our President, His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, and from the Mayors of Gloucester, Cheltenham and Tewkesbury were carried to St. James's Palace and handed to H.R.H. The Duke of Gloucester, who presided at the ceremony as President of the N.A.B.C. A Civic Reception at County Hall, London, followed and later in the

evening Festival Hall was filled to capacity for "Clubs are Trumps", a gala show featuring Club boys together with artistes of screen, stage and television, many of whom were former Club members.

Special features in Gloucestershire included a Flag Day and a House-to-House Collection, which were supplemented by open nights

and many special events in individual Clubs.

This year's record reflects great credit on our Clubs, and a list of those taking part, together with the amounts raised, is included in this report. All have done well, but there is no complacency, and plans are now being made which will, we hope, result in yet another record for 1958.

REGIONAL ARTS FESTIVALS

Although only two Clubs, Nailsworth Boys' Club and Whaddon and College Boys' Club, entered for this years Arts Festival, the standard of work submitted was of an extremely high order. Awards are given on a national basis and members can be proud of the five First Class, nine Second Class, and six Third Class awards gained. Perhaps this success may encourage more Clubs to make these activities a part of their programme.

MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE CONFERENCE

Because of petrol rationing the Third Annual Management Committee Conference was postponed until June 6th, 1957, when a most successful gathering took place at Whaddon and College Boys' Club where, after an admirable address by Dr. A. E. Morgan, LL.D. (Warden of Toynbee Hall and Chairman of the N.A.B.C. Industrial Advisory Committee), followed by informal discussion, members were able to look round these specially designed and very attractive Club premises.

FULL-TIME LEADER TRAINING

Last year it was reported that Mr. Norman Godwin had joined the N.A.B.C. six-months Training Course at St. Pierre. An old boy of St. Mark's Youth Club, Mr. Godwin has now completed his course and has recently been appointed full-time Leader of his old Club.

SPORT

Almost all Clubs take part in sports activities in their own locality, yet keen interest is still maintained in all the Inter-Club Competitions.

Although individual successes are recorded elsewhere in this report, it may be mentioned that over fifty boys were nominated for County Trial Matches. Two were nominated for National Soccer Trials, and though we gained no places in the first English Teams, subsequently three members of our County team represented the N.A.B.C. in a match against a German Youth XI at Hereford in May.



In Rugby we were again successful and one-third of the English team in the matches against Wales were members of our Clubs.

A County Cricket XI was again selected and our Annual matches against Bristol and Oxfordshire were played at Cowley and Gloucester:—







is a democratic community of Clubs united by a common purpose. The strength of its influence comes from the vitality and support of its constituent self-governing Clubs. It promotes the welfare of boys between the ages of fourteen and eighteen, and helps Clubs to increase their efficiency in the following ways:—

General Services

Specialised advice and information are given freely by trained and experienced officers about the technique, problems and methods of modern Boys' Club work.

The N.A.B.C. co-operates with the Ministry of Education, local authorities, other appropriate Government departments and voluntary organisations, on behalf of the Boys' Club movement throughout the country.

It gives advice about Club activities, develops new Clubs in areas where they are most needed, and acts as a channel for grants-in-aid from certain funds.

It arranges an annual Conference at which leaders discuss matters of national importance affecting Boys' Club work.

It offers Clubs a comprehensive accident insurance to cover boys and leaders.

Training

The N.A.B.C. maintains the following centres:

St. Pierre, Chepstow—for the training of full-time and voluntary leaders, helpers, and senior boys.

Nash Court, Ludlow-for all kinds of camping.

Conferences and courses on general and specialised aspects of Boys' Club work and activities are arranged regularly at the above centres and elsewhere.


"Adjustment to Industry" courses are also held in various places for boys during their first years in Industry. The purpose of these courses is to teach a responsible attitude towards work.

Religion

Sport and Physical Fitness

The N.A.B.C. encourages sport and physical activities in all its affiliated Clubs. It holds annual football matches and boxing tournaments between counties on an elimination basis up to a national level. A specialist advisor on physical training helps Clubs throughout the country to prepare suitable programmes. The N.A.B.C. also runs a national fitness charter and scheme in order to improve physical fitness of all club members.

Publications

All affiliated and associated Clubs receive a free copy of the Association's quarterly magazine "The Boy," which contains articles written by experts on a wide range of subjects. A "News Service" bulletin of topical information is sent to them each month. The N.A.B.C. also publishes many booklets and leaflets on club work and activities. (A list will be sent on request.)

Picture Scheme

A number of excellent reproductions of good pictures is available for sale to Clubs at reasonable prices.

AFFILIATION TO N.A.B.C.

To be granted affiliation or associate membership a Club must exist for the promotion of the spiritual, mental and physical welfare of its members and must be conducted in conformity with the principles and aims of the Association.

The following is a summary of the conditions laid down in the byelaws of the N.A.B.C. and by the Executive Council.

To qualify for affiliation a Club must:

(a) have premises in which it meets regularly.

(b) have an adult leader.

(c) have an adult Management Committee.(d) charge a regular membership subscription.

(e) have a membership which comprises at least fifteen boys between the ages of fourteen and eighteen.

(f) meet at least two nights a week.

(g) have a Boys' Committee.

(h) be open at all reasonable times to be visited by an accredited officer of the Association.

Boys' Sections of Mixed Clubs

To qualify for affiliation as a boys' section of a mixed Club, a Club must fulfil all the above conditions and, in addition, either have accommodation so that a boy shall be able to take part in the Club activities with other boys separately from girls:

or

accommodation must be reserved for boys one night in the week for Clubs that open on four or less nights a week, and on two nights for Clubs that open on five or more nights a week.




