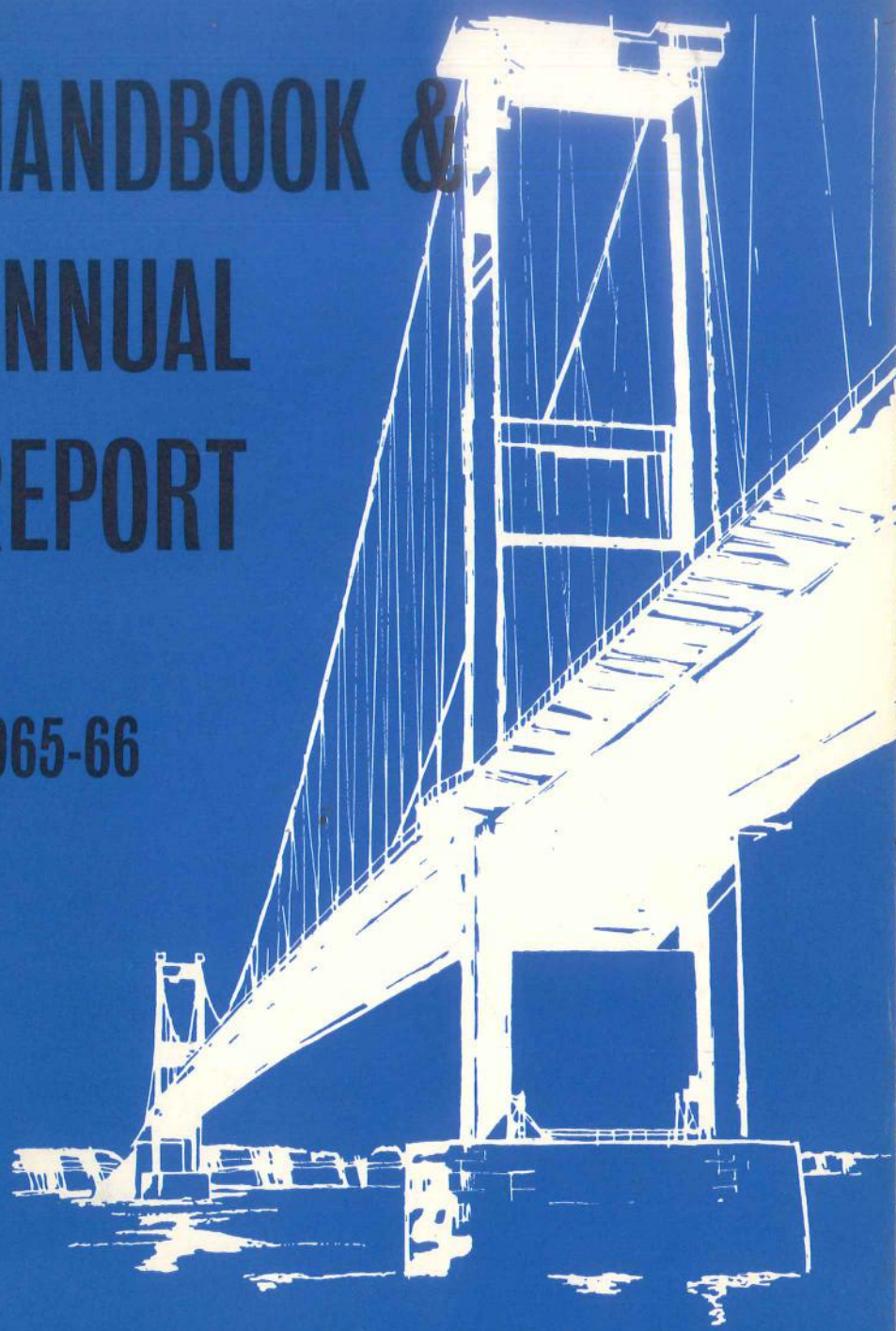

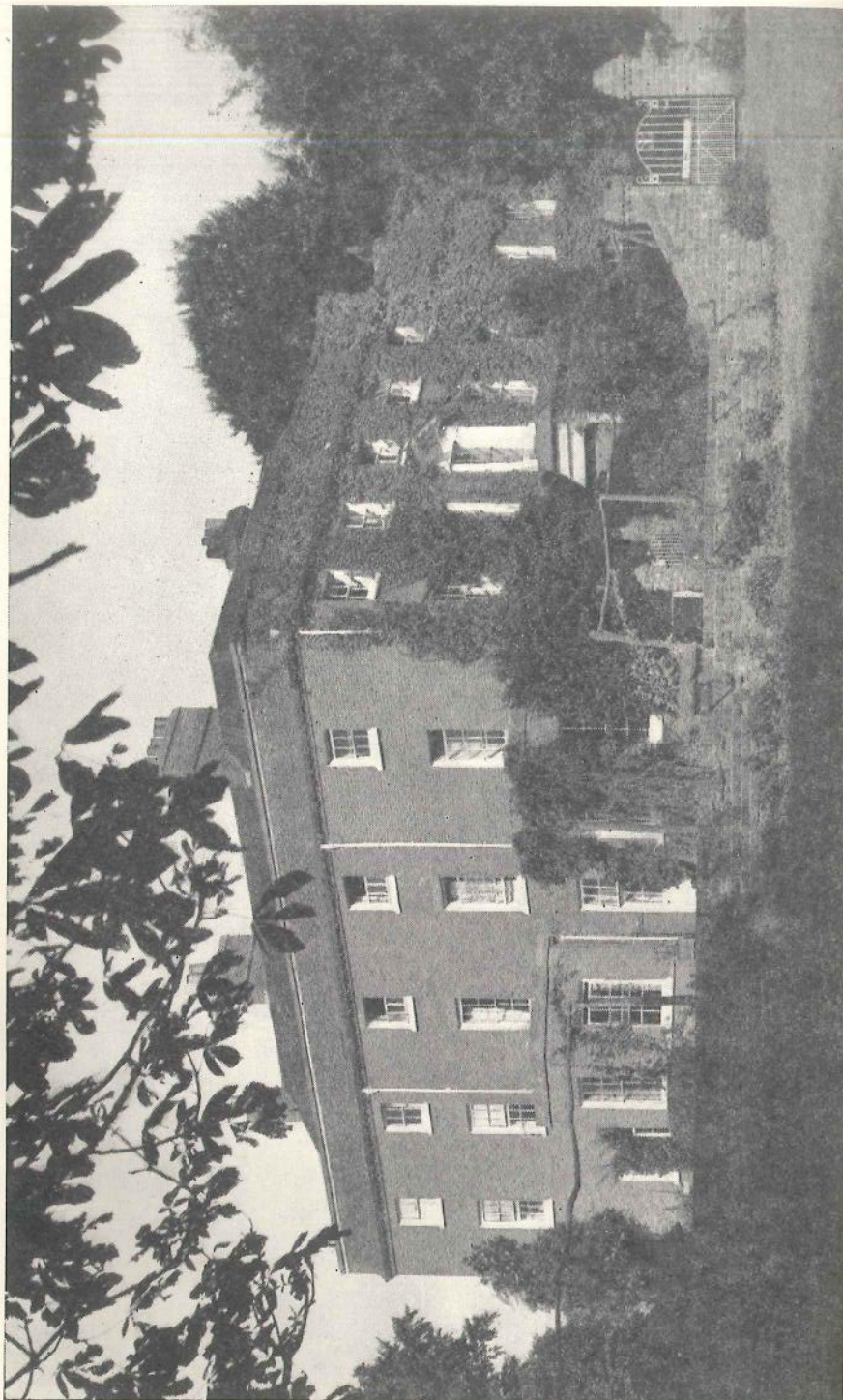

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

OUR PRINCIPAL AIM

* 'In contemporary society achievement stands at a high premium. But if success is the universal goal, it is clear that only a few will ever attain it. In terms of the high demand for success most men will feel themselves to be relative failures, unless there are other goals and values which reassure them of their social worthiness.'

Perhaps movements such as ours are not articulate enough. We know, but don't say with enough force, that there are other goals and other values. Indeed our present society must have them to survive and, fortunately, there are many men and women among us who give to material success its proper perspective, knowing that those other goals and values are the ones that really count. This is not headline news but it is very important to those who take more than a passing interest in the world about them.

We have in the Boys' Club movement a cross-section of young people from a variety of environments. Many will want material success, some will achieve it; many will find a purpose in life which gives satisfaction to themselves and others but brings little outward reward. It is our task to encourage and introduce ideas, activity and opportunity matched to the needs of the individual boy.

We have as our principal aim, development of the whole boy into the whole man, mentally, spiritually and physically. The success at which we aim is a man whose life is guided by principle, knowledge and a true sense of value, and not merely by the brittle standards which contemporary society tends to set for success. Let there be material achievement by all means but let there be more, too, for all too often those who speed by find that the most important thing they have passed is life itself.

Those who come forward in the service of young people to give time, knowledge and above all friendship find themselves rewarded by a warmth and appreciation no commercial standard can ever measure.

There are many such men and in this we are fortunate, but the many are still not enough for there is so much more to be done. We need the help of all who read this report. We need it in the fifty clubs on our lists and in the many more that could start with your help.

A PROBLEM YEAR

The past year has perhaps brought more problems to Youth Service than ever before. A Government ban on capital expenditure has been in operation throughout the year and only now after eighteen months are slight signs of relaxation becoming evident. Changes in taxation were made which could well have made it more difficult for industry and individuals to continue their generous support. Press reports raised doubts on future government policy and there were those who suggested that the implementation of the Newsom Report recommendations would sound the death knell of the Voluntary Youth Service.

Strong representation from all voluntary organisations has eased the effect of new taxes though there are other problems now being raised by the selective employment tax on which the outcome is not yet clear. Our own National Association has played a very active part in tackling all these problems. The implications of the Newsom Report are now being studied and far from being dismayed at some of the proposals, we should be grateful that formal education has at last realised that the work we have been doing for so many years must be its concern too. Perhaps with good will and intelligent application we may see the beginning of a partnership where for too long there has often been division.

More will be said of finance later, suffice it to say here that, despite uncertainty, in so many fields, the support for our work has this year been so encouraging that some of the things we have worked for over a good number of years are now becoming possible.

DEVELOPMENT

Membership

New clubs have joined us during the year and we welcome the Dowty Group Apprentices' Association, the Marshfield Youth Club, the new club at Broadwell, Sharpness Boys' Club and Fielding's Apprentices' Association. We hope they will enjoy the association and use our local and national facilities to the full.

Boys' Clubs need no further justification than that boys continue to demand them, proof of that demand is shown year after year in our growing membership.

New Building

It is a tribute to the Club Committee and its Voluntary Leader that the biggest boys' club development in the County is now complete and will be formally opened later this year. Tremendous difficulties have been overcome and the running of the club on a purely voluntary basis will present more. All of us would congratulate the Ramblers' on their fine achievement and the spirit which will surely make their club one of the most effective units in the City of Gloucester.

At Gotherington, through devoted leadership and great support, not only from the Committee but from the whole community, a very attractive club, in Cotswold stone, has been completed and declared open by our Chairman. This is a project which will have a value not only for its own boys but for the village as a whole.

In the heart of the Forest, Broadwell faced with the loss of rented premises and a consequent decline in membership, gathered a strong committee together and, through the generosity of a local firm, acquired a hut on an old prisoner-of-war camp. Here, by their efforts and with help from the Authority, they have created very useful club premises, so successful have they been that it has been necessary to take over a further building so that model-making, canoe-building and craft-work could go on unhindered by general club activities.

At Hereford, a most attractive canteen has been built inside the main club room, not only providing a most useful facility, but making the club room itself much more attractive.

At Whaddon and College Boys' Club in Cheltenham a very useful activities hall has been completed and is in full use.

The new changing and shower accommodation at Cirencester is in use and plans are now in hand for renovating and re-wiring the rest of the club premises.

At Nailsworth the flood-lit hard playing area was opened by Frankie Vaughan in October and is proving a great boon in a district where level surfaces are hard to find.

Provisional approval has been given for new club buildings at Brockworth and Down Hatherley but no starting date has yet been forthcoming. We hope there will not be further long delay for already a year has added to costs that will rise even more sharply.

Again at Hereford permission is awaited for an extension to house the club bus and provide a workshop and repair section. Whilst at Bussage plans will shortly be sent to the Ministry for a sizable extension to their premises.

At Sharpness negotiations have been opened with the County Planning Committee for permission to convert a hall into suitable club premises. These negotiations are, however, not proceeding without difficulty.

TRAINING

Leadership

Throughout a member's club life he is undergoing training in skill, in responsibility, or in 'getting along' with other people. This is the basis of our work. There is, nevertheless, a great and perhaps growing need for a wider training for both leaders and members not only so that they may order their own affairs more efficiently, but that they might see themselves, their club and their movement as an integral and an important part of the life of the community in which they live.

We are trying to meet this need and have continued with the second phase of our three-year Senior Member Training with some success, and the Courses will be added to by the inclusion of a third stage during the coming winter. Senior members who have reached this fairly advanced level will be given much more responsibility, not only for the conduct of their part of the course but for its content too.

Regular Leaders' Meetings have continued and a successful County week-end Conference was held. The Committee were a little disappointed that an additional Voluntary Leaders' Certificate Course had to be cancelled because of insufficient support, though there is hope that this will come into being later on. It is most interesting that, because of the failure of this course, ways had to be found of getting training to a number of leaders who were disappointed, and a trial scheme of 'in service training' was devised, for help with which we owe a great deal to 'Don' Jones, the Gloucestershire Training Officer, who has undertaken this experimental task. A similar scheme is being tried in other selected areas of the South-west and we may learn much from the result.

Helpers, leaders and members continue to support National Courses for Training, and, though the number is not large, the steadily growing numbers looking for this wider experience and personal contact are a very useful leaven to our own efforts.

During the year there has been a strengthening of our Training Committee and it has welcomed some very knowledgeable people to its ranks. A tremendous field of both opportunity and challenge lie before them, and it is their intention to accept that challenge step by step, for they know that all concerned with our cause and with the Society in which it is set, must be conscious of the need for training whether it be to lead a Management Committee or accept a minor role in membership of a club.

Training with Industry

The Association continued to offer to industry throughout Gloucestershire and neighbouring counties our series of Adjustment to Industry Courses, and these have been extremely well supported. We shall continue to be indebted to the large panel of speakers and tutors who, despite their own industrial commitments, continue to give so much of their time and thought to this aspect of our work, giving to boys, early in their industrial life, the opportunity to look at the whole picture of industry and its place and theirs in our country's present and future life.

Four more of these five-day courses have been arranged for the winter of 1966/67.

Adventure

We were delighted when, at the end of last year, British Rail, who have already helped so much with our Adventure Centre, at Kerne Bridge, presented and installed a railway coach alongside the

existing building. Our plans for expansion were rudely shattered when, one evening, vandals systematically destroyed almost all the windows and much of the internal furnishings. This was a sad blow but the plans are being re-drawn and we shall ultimately achieve the better provision we intend, the cost will inevitably be more.

Not all was lost, however, a very generous, anonymous gift of £50 heartened us considerably. Meanwhile the station itself has continued to be fully used and is a most valuable asset. For the continued maintenance of this project we remain indebted to the Trustees of Smiths Charity and the practical work of club leaders and our Honorary Warden.

Nothing has been said of the close contact of our leaders and members at Regional level, but it is very real, as all who know our Regional Conference will testify, nor have we written of the constant exchange between Clubs, not only in this County but far afield. Boys have worked on Snowdon or Drakes Island, have ventured 100 miles by canoe, have climbed mountains or gone deep into the earth in Mendip caves. These are the day to day activities of our boys, who will be ready to accept the further challenges of adult life – it is our task and yours to help with whatsoever talent we possess.

Art and Crafts

Entries for the Arts Festival this year were disappointing in number though not in quality or variety, for craftwork, painting, short stories, poetry, tape recording and music were included and special mention should be made of Down Hatherley, who, for the second year, gained a 'Gold' award, St. Michaels for a variety of painting, pottery and craftwork, Marshfield for some first-class Art Exhibits and both Gotherington and Brockworth for their entries all of which were on display at the opening of the new Gotherington Club Building.

It was more than encouraging, too, that Brockworth should have been the centre of two 'art sessions' at which they were joined by boys from Gotherington. Arrangements were under the capable hands of Harry West, N.A.B.C. Arts Adviser, and so successful were these evenings that they may well be the fore-runners of more. The results suitably framed were exhibited in the foyer of a Weston-super-Mare Hotel during the Regional Leaders' Conference.

SPORT

Orienteering

Competitive activity continues unabated. While some of the more traditional games are gradually losing popularity, others take their place and none perhaps more spectacularly than Orienteering, which we have particularly encouraged. Shortly after the major competition which we organised jointly with our L.E.A., came news of the

The Chairman's Appeal

While this Report gives an encouraging account of the development of our membership, buildings, activities and facilities, we have long been conscious that much more could and should be done if only we had more money.

During the late summer of 1965, the Chairman launched an appeal for new funds. In this he asked prospective donors to promise support over a seven year period by completing individual Deeds of Covenant. The response was most generous and increased the income of the Association by just over £800 per annum (including Income Tax recoverable on net payments). The County Education Authority, recognising the effort made by private subscribers, has supplemented the amount raised, and we are at last in a position to recruit an assistant to the Organising Secretary. This shortage of essential staff has been the most serious handicap to our efforts and to expansion for a long time. The names of the members of the Committee responsible for the success of this Appeal appear on page eleven front of this Report. The members of our clubs will be indebted to them for many years to come.

Accounts

The audited accounts are enclosed in another section of this Report, and you will see that they have been submitted in a form which can be readily understood by those who are interested. We met our commitments in the year ended on 31st March, 1966, and the books were balanced. It is the Honorary Treasurer's responsibility to do just that, and allow us to spend only up to the amount of our available income. In other words the more he has to look after, the more he can allow us to do. The income side of the Balance Sheet can never show a total which is large enough to enable us to do all that we should like to do in the service of the boys in our area.

The Association wishes to record its gratitude to all those who have helped us in our work during the year; it would be impossible to list them all nor do we think that they would wish it.

DEEDS OF COVENANT

The Association is especially grateful to the SUBSCRIBERS WHO HAVE EXECUTED DEEDS OF COVENANT, and whose subscriptions are thereby increased by 66 per cent.

In this Country, the Government has approved the system whereby a recognized charity is allowed to recover from the Inland Revenue authorities the amount of tax which a Subscriber has already paid on the income from which he has made the gift. This is only allowed if the Subscriber guarantees to pay the particular charity the same subscription for seven consecutive years.

At the present standard rate of income tax, the value of the subscription is increased by 66 per cent WITHOUT ADDITIONAL COST TO THE SUBSCRIBER.

AFFILIATION TO N.A.B.C.

To be granted affiliation or associate membership a Club must exist for the promotion of the spiritual, mental and physical welfare of its members and must be conducted in conformity with the principles and aims of the Association.

The following is a summary of the conditions laid down in the bye-laws of the N.A.B.C. and by the Executive Council.

To qualify for affiliation a Club must:

- have premises in which it meets regularly.
- have an adult leader.
- have an adult Management Committee.
- charge a regular membership subscription.
- have a membership which comprises at least fifteen boys between the ages of fourteen and eighteen.
- meet at least two nights a week.
- have a Boys' Committee.
- be open at all reasonable times to be visited by an accredited officer of the Association.

Old Boys' Clubs

To qualify for affiliation an Old Boys' Club must fulfil the general conditions for affiliation, and in addition:

- it must have at least fifteen members between the ages of eighteen and twenty-five, and
- it must be directly related to a Boys' Club and wholly or mainly recruited therefrom.

Specialist Groups

In appropriate cases associate membership may be granted to single activity Clubs.

Boys' Sections of Mixed Clubs

To qualify for affiliation as a Boys' Section of a Mixed Club a club must fulfil certain conditions and meet certain standards of accommodation.

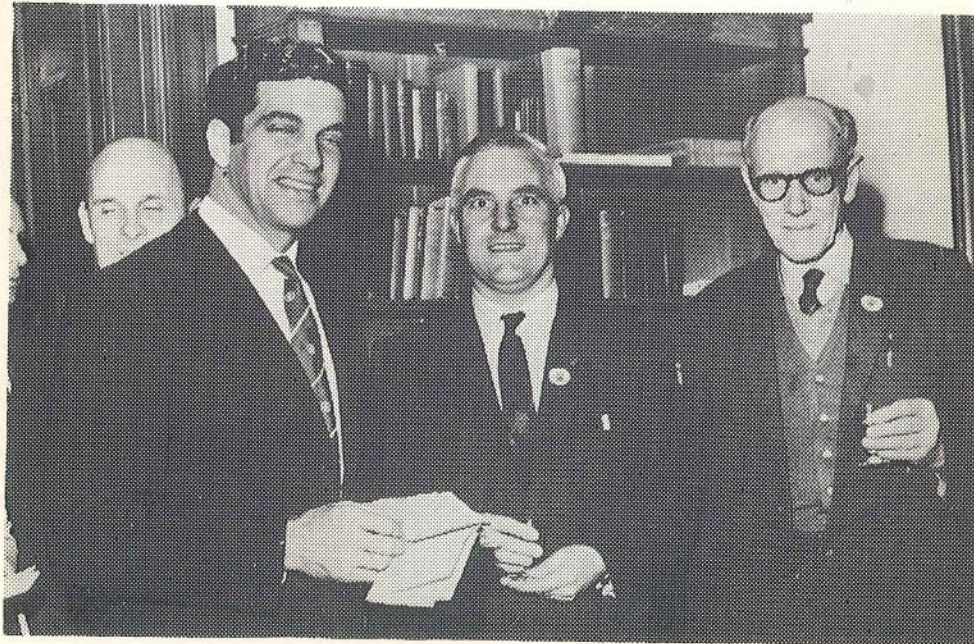

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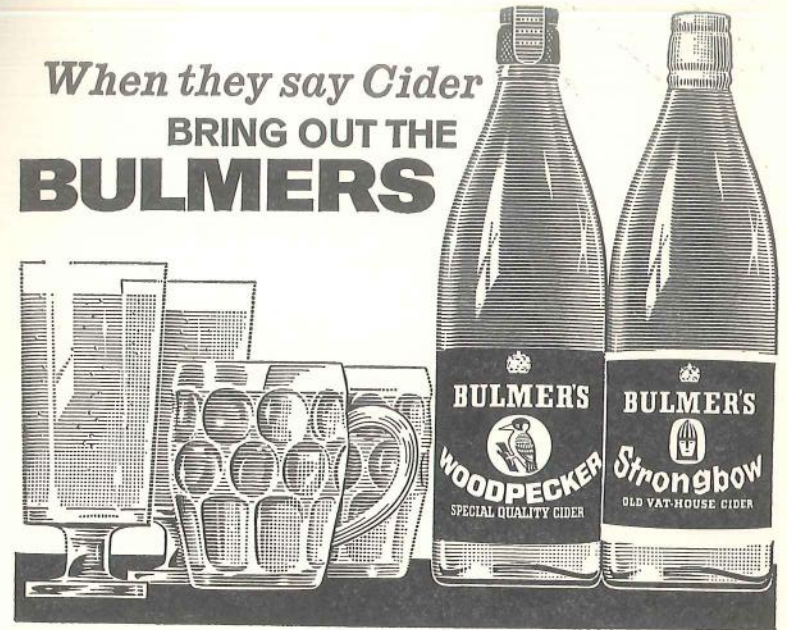
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ADJUSTMENT TO INDUSTRY

COURSES HELD BY THE GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF BOYS' CLUBS

(approved by the Industrial Training Boards)

PURPOSE :

To help boys in their first years at work to develop a right attitude towards their employment and to encourage them to use their leisure to good purpose.

METHOD :

The Association runs Residential Courses from Wednesday to Sunday. The number of boys attending varies from preferably not less than 28 to not more than 40. 4 Courses are organized, from November to March, at Cowley Manor, Nr. Cheltenham.

CONSIDERATION :

An attitude to work cannot be taught. It is, however, possible to give boys sufficient information to enable them to reach general conclusions. By ensuring that the atmosphere of the Course and the attitudes of the staff set the highest possible standards, the boys are given the circumstances in which they can reach conclusions that are most likely to be of the right kind.
