EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE'S REPORT

With each day that passes the spotlight of publicity is thrown again and again on the activities of young people, the students, the marchers, the protesters and the drop-outs, whilst those in authority cast round almost desperately to find what has caused this lack of understanding between the generations. We can attribute the blame perhaps justly to many causes, commercial exploitation, permissive society, break-down of family life or the many new cults in education. We can blame them all but, ultimately, we must ask the question of ourselves; have we placed possessions before people, have we been willing, ourselves, to help young people, our own included, or have we left the major task to 'them'.

There have been numerous reports recently on work with young people and the theorists argue this way and that. The latest "Youth and Community in the 70's", is no exception, making the startling 'discovery' that young people should be part of the Community, and that those already working with them merit a great deal more support both from local authorities and the public than they get at present. The first 'discovery' really sums up what boys' clubs are all about: they are led by men of skill and principle, who work with boys through their adolescent years, helping them gain the will and

knowledge to become useful and effective citizens.

We believe a good Boys' Club can do much to create the right environment for this working together but our interests are not confined to the boy in his chib, as the Report seems to suggest. Our work extends out into the Community giving help where and when we can. There is nothing new in this for we have long known that if we are to help in any effective way we must be concerned with the boy in every respect, be it home, work or leisure. Almost all our leaders have families of their own and we need that personal experience. We are closely concerned with the boy and young man in his work and have a special relationship with Industry, particularly in the field of training, whilst in our clubs, thank goodness, are a great many adult volunteers, both men and women, who, because of their own knowledge, of industry and commerce, are all the better equipped to help the boy make progress for himself.

This is what we are about – how we have carried it out in the past year is in part indicated in the rest of this Report. We know the task we have to do and we shall continue to ask for your help in carrying it out, for much of the future is in your hands now.

A Problem Year

The last year has not been an easy one. The slashing cut of 75% in grant aid made by the local authority was serious and the withdrawal

of that part which went directly towards the salary of our Assistant Secretary meant that this appointment had to be terminated. This was a double loss, not only because we had to do without a much-needed Assistant but because it withdrew an accepted and practical training opportunity for a young man before undertaking the

full-time course of theory necessary for qualification.

Strong representations to the local authority were not successful despite support for reconsideration by the Education Committee; and it would seem reasonable, particularly in view of the authority's surpluses over the year, to press publicly and continually for at least the same measure of support as obtains elsewhere in the Country. There have been other disturbing features which have done little to foster the partnership between the voluntary bodies and the authority, for during the year, the local Youth Committees, traditionally representative, have been reformed into sub-Committees of the authority with no representation from any voluntary body. It is at least hopeful that the new report on Youth Work expresses the strongest criticism of this bureaucratic type of organisation and urges the need for proper representation on all committees with special mention of those concerned with policy.

Our Association is, however, realistic, we have to be, and whilst we regret and must, as a public duty, point out the very real dangers of the present situation, we must decline to be discouraged and get on with our own work. This we believe we have done. Some cuts in our services have been inevitable, particularly in the important field of club visiting, but we have been greatly encouraged by the increasing support, financial and personal, given not only by our own National Association and charitable trusts, but by many private individuals throughout the county. In the main field of our work we have made no cuts at all and in some areas extended our services and we are

much in debt to the many who have made this possible.

Boys' Clubs and the Community

There are still many outside the Movement who think of our work only within the context of the club, not appreciating that the club itself is only the focal point for activity and enterprise that extends out into the community around, whilst our concern for the whole boy means that our work actively extends not only into the social life of the area, but must have particular concern for the boy at work. We can only present a few of the facts, hoping that these will be used to give some indication of the whole.

Training

Though we believe all our work is training for a fuller life, a great deal is undertaken as a special and direct activity.

Young Men in Industry

At least six weeks every year are specifically set aside for training with industry and our current programme covers two main groups.

Adjustment to Industry

Each winter we run at least four and sometimes five one-week courses for young men in their first years in Industry, and that over 3,000 young workers have now attended these courses is some evidence of their success. On the courses which are residential boys meet and talk with men from all sides of industry, from the shop floor worker to the managing director, all giving their time and their knowledge so that the boy may have a better understanding. Basic economics, national finance and leisure time activity these, too, form part of a course throughout which adults work closely with boys, not expecting to achieve miracles but rather to establish guide-lines and attitudes and provide the knowledge on which the boy can build for himself.

Responsibility in Industry

As a logical development from our Adjustment to Industry Courses for the younger worker, and after a great deal of consultation with industrialists, we sponsored a new course for the more senior young man, extending over two full weeks. Drakes Island is the venue and during each day through sailing, climbing, canoeing and an extremely tough expedition on Dartmoor, the young men are encouraged not only to accept physical challenge to the limit of their own capacity, but perhaps more important, encouraged to develop skill and pleasure in a new pursuit. Each evening is given over to visiting speakers who, working with the boys informally, discuss not only the problems of work but the many facets of which life is made up.

Those who attended the last course had the added attraction of putting out to sea on the "Nonsuch", a replica of the Hudson Bay Company's ship, which founded their Empire and which is now in Canada. That, on the way they fought a battle, with the "Regina Marie", a schooner retracing Capt. Cook's voyages, added to the interest. A further course will be held this year, particularly for Gloucestershire firms and it will be noted that from our small beginnings, other firms throughout the country are taking an interest and at Drakes Island alone five of these courses will be run this year.

Voluntary Leaders Certificate Course

With the help of our National Association and very practical co-operation from the Salesian Brothers at Beckford who were our hosts, we were, for the first time, able to mount a residential training course for voluntary leaders. Many who attended were already studying at Beckford prior to going out to work amongst boys in places as far-distant as Malta and South Africa as well as here at home. Other leaders and helpers came from clubs in Cheltenham, Brockworth, Gloucester and Broadwell. With speakers provided nationally the course ran over four long weekends with students

doing practical work over ten weeks in clubs. Each student also undertook a special project which was presented on the last weekend. On the final day certificates were presented to the 20 students by Mr. Neville Goodridge, Deputy General Secretary of the N.A.B.C. and by the Association Vice-Chairman, Mr. Dennis Fredjohn. It is anticipated that this type of course will be a firm addition to our training programme in future years.

Conferences and Meetings

All conferences within our Movement are in themselves fairly intensive training sessions and many of our leaders and helpers attend. Our Regional Conference at Weston-super-Mare this year attracted a particularly good representation from Gloucestershire as did the National Conference at Chichester, whilst well over 100 were also present at our Annual General Meeting which was so ably addressed by Mr. Simpson of Her Majesty's Inspectorate.

Kerne Bridge Adventure and Training Centre

A great deal of training and adventure work is carried out at our own Centre which has been fully booked at weekends and quite often during the week, throughout the year. Over 60 groups, catering for just over 600 boys have run their own courses some quite formal and some based on activity. Only at Christmas and New Year have there been vacant dates. Apart from the regular use by our own clubs, we have been able to offer facilities for school-boy holidays, while schools, adventure groups and clubs from Bristol, Worcestershire, Hampshire, Northamptonshire, London and Plymouth as well as Army Apprentices have used the facilities we are able to offer. Those who helped us so generously to acquire this facility will be glad to know how fully the service they helped to provide is being used and interested to hear that a visit to Kerne has given others ideas on developing along similar lines themselves.

Sail Training and Tall Ships

With continuing help from a generous sponsor, we have again been able to offer a berth on the "Malcolm Miller" to a club member and John Lannen of Northway is this year taking this training opportunity.

Another seafarer is Anthony Steel of Bryce Berger and Brockworth who will be a member of the N.A.B.C. crew of the Charm III in the Tall Ships Race. Anthony's interest was aroused through attending the Responsibility in Industry Course at Drakes Island last September.

Training Officers and Leaders Visit Drakes Island

One event which may not be strictly training in itself but which will almost certainly have its effect was the special arrangements made for

Bricks and Mortar

Development of new club buildings is probably one of the most frustrating aspects of our work at the present time and the clubs can hardly be blamed for being hesitant about getting involved in this field but it is important that we press on, creating new and better buildings despite the obstacles in our way.

We have long held, and in this are supported by the new Youth Service Report, that the large expensive properties mainly erected by the authorities since Albermarle are not the answer, for often the smaller club, sited in the centre of the community it serves, dependent on that community for support, and practical help, can offer a more personal service, and, of course, it involves far less initial and continuing expenditure of public funds. Long and sometimes unnecessary delays can, however, frustrate local people to a point where they are no longer interested, boys who raise money for their new building grow out of the club and sometimes marry before the first brick is laid – this should be a matter of urgent national concern.

For the third year we report on projected development in Cheltenham, Bussage and Broadwell and some progress has been made. The Cossack project in Cheltenham has at last received Ministry approval and should now quickly go ahead. Bussage, supported in principle by the local authority, but denied any grant aid from that source, has just been visited by Officials from the Ministry so that they may see the situation for themselves – a decision awaited since 1966 cannot much longer be delayed. Broadwell, still housed in steadily collapsing P.O.W. huts, have the land and a good portion of the money. They, too, still await Ministry sanction.

During the past year affiliation has been granted to clubs at Matson, Longlevens and Whiteshill and it is anticipated that the increasing interest being taken by apprentice groups will result in an increase in affiliations in this area during the coming year. On the debit side, due to problems of premises, Dursley Boys' Club has closed though it is hoped that this closure will be only temporary. Two other clubs have not, so far, renewed their affiliation for the current year.

Club Week is a Record

Throughout the year members subscribe to the upkeep of their club by weekly or monthly subscriptions, by payment for special activities and by doing practical work in and around the club building. In addition to this, for one week each year, clubs throughout the country make a special effort not only to raise money but to publicise the work of the club as well.

This year clubs taking part had some really significant successes, raising over £1,700 after all expenses had been paid. This is not only a measure of the work done by members in raising this amount but practical evidence of the support given to the club by the community

around it.

Activity is the Keynote

It is not possible in the space available to give any great detail of the range of activity which goes on throughout the year. Almost every weekend one or two major events take place and it should be emphasised that these are only the final stage of activities which may have been working through various qualifying rounds in clubs for some time before. Most of our activities start at club level and proceed, perhaps after trials, to County, Regional and National events, giving boys the opportunity of achievement at a level which matches their own capability.

National Events come to Gloucestershire International Rugby

Cheltenham is now a popular venue for the return match against Wales and we were pleased to act as hosts again this year. That a good number of Gloucestershire boys were in the English team was an added attraction and for us anyway, the resultant win for England, after a very good game, could be called most satisfactory.

100 Mile Canoe Test

We have now been hosts three times for this testing national event in which boys from all over the country gather together to complete 100 miles in four days. It should be emphasised that this is not a race, everyone who completes the test is a personal winner. The expedition finished, this year, at Gloucester Quay and to see 230 canoes in formation coming in to salute the welcoming party—among which were His Worship the Mayor, the Sheriff of Gloucester, Lord Robertson of Oakridge and many other civic dignitaries—was a most impressive sight. Over 400 were in the party which was the largest ever. Boys from a number of Gloucestershire clubs were, of course, present and some will be going on to a Cross Channel Canoe Expedition later in the year.

Regional Festival of Sport

R.A.F. Colerne was again the venue for the Regional Festival in which teams drawn from Counties in the South West of England competed in a wide range of activity which included gymnastics, trampoline, basketball, five-a-side and table tennis. Six hours of non-stop activity for boys who had already gained their places through club and county championships. We did not win but we enjoyed ourselves and two of our members again go forward to Crystal Palace to represent Gloucestershire at Table Tennis in the National Festival of Sport.

County Events

One of the problems we now face is that there really are not enough weekends to go round for a programme which now includes intercounty football and cricket, basketball, table tennis, five-a-side, rugby, cross-country, orienteering, chess, angling, tennis, tug-of-war, six-a-side, arts festivals, athletics, training courses, etc. These with individual work, trials or club championships add up to a great deal of member participation and, ultimately, many personal successes. Few of these events could take place without a great measure of help from members of the Association's Sports Committee, leaders and helpers. We could do with more but this is the inevitable consequence of successful expansion.

Not in Isolation

Mention has already been made of the use of some of our services by groups outside our Movement. The efforts which we make to encourage co-operation of this sort with other groups are not generally realised. We have, this year, approached every school in the County to see if a link could be established here, not, we must add, with any great response so far. We are continually asked by outside bodies for help and this we do our best to give. Our club buildings are used for many other purposes in the daytime for nurseries, for handicapped people, for factory lunch clubs and the like. Members help with holidays for children in care and two clubs are currently seeking to sponsor a particularly adventurous holiday for local handicapped children. These are but a few of the ties many clubs have within the community, examples of the belief our Movement has always held that our work can never be in isolation and that every club and every member is a natural and integral part of the community which they both serve and from which they draw support.

Held in Trust

Through the efforts of the many friends of our late Chairman, Mr. Martin Cadbury, a trust fund has been established which, administered by the Association, will be known as the Martin Cadbury Memorial Fund. In accordance with the wishes expressed the income from the Fund will be used to award bursaries to young men so that they may take part in opportunities for personal development and challenge in which Martin had a very real interest and belief.

FINANCE

The Audited Accounts are enclosed in another section of this Report and once again we hope that they will be studied carefully.

The year under review has not been without its difficulties as we have had to manage our finances within the further - and heavy - cut in Grant Aid provided by the Gloucestershire County Council. That we have succeeded in doing so is due to a number of factors, space permitting mention of but two. Firstly - and this was a regrettable and retrograde step - the appointment of an Assistant Organising Secretary has temporarily lapsed (saving his salary) and, secondly, an increased N.A.B.C. Grant was most gratefully received and this did much to ensure that the year was not unsuccessful financially.

We have received Donations from many sources - those responsible we have tried to thank for their practical encouragement and would sincerely regret any omission to do so - but a special word of thanks is due to Mr. Christian Brann who has given so much time and thought to the presentation of the information supplied to him in connection with the Appeal recently made by our President. As a result of this we have gained more friends and a wider understanding of the problems of finance which go hand-in-hand with the practical work of Boys' Clubs.

The Executive Committee, in full knowledge of the work undertaken on behalf of the Association and member clubs, by so many people gratefully acknowledges the service that has been given, and we know that leaders and members would wish us to record our appreciation of the very considerable help given by "Alf" Gibbs, Regional Officer for many years and now General Secretary of the London Federation and by Alex Cox who made a significant contribution to development and training in Gloucestershire. We welcome to the South West "Bob" Elliott, well-known to Boys' Clubs through the N.A.B.C. Mobile Training Wing and as Secretary of Kent Association. To our many Subscribers and to the following we give our most grateful thanks for doing so much to make our work possible:-

Our National Association and the King George Jubilee Trust for substantial financial and practical help during a difficult period.





The age limit is normally 16, but where satisfactory G.C.E.s or C.S.E.s have been obtained as a result of staying at school until after the 17th birthday, exceptions can be made. Day release is given with a view to obtaining: Ordinary and Higher National Certificates or alternatively advanced Technician City and Guilds qualifications. 



ADJUSTMENT TO INDUSTRY

COURSES HELD BY THE GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF BOYS' CLUBS

(approved by the Industrial Training Boards)

PURPOSE:

To help boys in their first years at work to develop a right attitude towards their employment and to encourage them to use their leisure to good purpose.

METHOD:

The Association runs Residential Courses from Wednesday to Sunday. The number of boys attending varies from preferably not less than 28 to not more than 40. 4 Courses are organized, from November to March, at Cowley Manor, Nr. Cheltenham.

CONSIDERATION:
