THE CHAIRMANS' REPORT

1964 - 65

"I think with you, that nothing is of more importance for the public weal, than to form and train up youth in wisdom and virtue. Wise and good men are, in my opinion, the strength of a state far more so than riches or arms."

(written by Benjamin Franklin some two hundred years ago)

THIS IS THE THIRD YEAR of our Five-Year Plan. Some progress has been made towards establishing a better liaison and understanding between our adult helpers and the young people in our affiliated Clubs. The rate of development must, of course, depend upon a close understanding and co-operation between all concerned in our work, together with a lively financial and human interest.

There is a desperate need to re-vitalise our service to young people. To be "with it" is the form best suited to their demands. We must maintain a creative lead, constructive help and sensible financial support from everyone, from the Government, Industry and all members of the Youth Service.

The future generation needs the most effective modern support it can get from those responsible for training in the mosaic of Education, Industry, Christianity, Leadership and Citizenship. The young are only young once. The guidance and help, by example, that they get from adults during their "growing-up time" are the vital stepping stones to a firm, wise, industrious or, a mediocre future.

It is with these thoughts in mind that the G.A.Y.C. training and development programme has been geared. We have recognised the need to improve the facilities and activities in training, to include "Skills in Adventure and Human Relationships" and to see that wherever possible the young people in our Clubs make the best use of their energy and ability in leisure-time training, in the right place and at the right time. I believe that the guidance and training we have to offer to many Youth Clubs, help to develop a sense of comradeship and confidence, mixed with a common understanding of sound Christian principles, mutual trust and respect between all concerned.

In the following pages of the Report there is, therefore, recorded ample evidence to support this belief.

Meanwhile during 1965-1966 an additional aim for the Association will be to continue to try and improve the picture of the Mixed Youth Club.

Recorded elsewhere in this Report are the achnowledgments and thanks of the Association to the countless number of people who help us. I should like to take this opportunity to send my personal best wishes and thanks to our President and Vice-Presidents, past members of the Executive Committee, the Members' Council, Youth Leaders, voluntary helpers and the many kind people who financially support us. I should also like to place on record, the appreciation of the Association to the excellent co-operation and understanding given to us by the various Statutory Authorities in the County of Gloucestershire.

The best wishes of the Association are also conveyed to Donald Jones who has left the G.A.Y.C. on promotion in the Youth Service of Gloucestershire. His past work was of the greatest value to us. His successor, Dudley Wilson, is warmly welcomed into the Association; his training and experience will undoubtedly help to maintain and develop the high standards attached to the exacting work of the Organising Secretary and Training Officer of the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs.

SOME DETAILS OF THE YEAR'S WORK

THE ASSOCIATION has sixty affiliated Clubs and also contact for various reasons another twenty-two Clubs, making a total of eighty-two being serviced by the G.A.Y.C. according to their needs. Thirteen new Clubs have been granted provisional affiliation since January, 1965. The Clubs vary from a small "one-night" a week, with a membership of fifteen, to the "six-nights" a week with 250 plus membership Clubs. There can, therefore, be no overall pattern, but they have the same common factor of meeting the needs of the young people in their area. The total affiliated Club membership is at present between 4,500 - 5,000 young people.

Mr Harry Clarke, of the Spectrum Youth Club, Cheltenham, has been accepted for training as a full-time Youth Worker and we wish him a very happy and successful year at the National College for the Training of Youth Leaders, Leicester.

In the year under review, Mr Raymond Metcalfe, another G.A.Y.C. former student completed a Training Course in connection with the Youth Employment Service and is now a full-time worker in this field.

Mr David Stocksborough has also been engaged on further training and is entering the Residential Child Care Service.

We extend our congratulations to both Raymond and David

and our best wishes for the future.

A new One-Year Training Course has now been launched by the National Association of Youth Clubs and a number of Gloucestershire students have enrolled. The range of training available to Leaders in Gloucestershire is increasing and the Specialised Course in Mixed Youth Club Work, provided by the Association, continues to play an important role in the development of comprehensive training in the area.

MEMBERS' COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT, 1964-65

Since the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs was formed in 1941 there has been an active Members' Council consisting of four officers elected annually by members of affiliated Clubs. With advice from senior members of the Association, the Council has gone from strength to strength maturing, as it should,

through experience and through the constructive criticism of its members.

The Officers of the Members' Council are responsible for the planning of the week-end meetings, three of which were held during the year 1964 - 65. Among the Guest Speakers at these week-ends were Mr Jack Singleton, B.B.C. Producer; Mr Harold Haywood, N.A.Y.C. Education Officer; Mr J. Barker, Assistant County Drama Adviser; and Mr Paul Setford, each directing their talks to the particular theme of the week-end. In discussion after the lectures, members contributed a very high standard of questioning and criticism. It is during these weekend Conferences that the Formal Meeting of the Members' Council takes place; this is one of the most important items on the programme, as it is at these meetings that the future events of the Members' Council are discussed. The members are very critical of themselves and are constantly on the look-out for something new and exciting in which to participate. The ideas are orally contributed and their merits discussed and afterwards it is the Officers of the Members' Council who discuss the suggestions further, adapting them if necessary to make them practical.

During the past year the G.A.Y.C. Members' Council has experienced many situations that occur from self-government and under the guiding hand of its advisers has become a strong voice in the affairs of the G.A.Y.C. at both member and Executive level. With the support of its members this position will be strengthened and will become, it is hoped, a Members' Council that will set an example and standard in its work that other County Members' Councils will follow.

ASSOCIATION HOLIDAY IN SPAIN, 1964

A PARTY OF FIFTEEN YOUNG PEOPLE from all parts of the county, led by Mr Donald Jones, Organising Secretary, left Gloucester by coach on Sunday, 16th August, 1964. We arrived in London

at 7 p.m. and spent an enjoyable evening in town before retiring to our hotel for the night to prepare for the following day's journey across the Channel. The crossing was very pleasant and three hours after leaving Newhaven we landed at Dieppe and boarded a train for Paris. By this time we really felt we were "on our way."

On arrival at St Lazare Station, Paris, we passed through the Customs and a luxury coach took us across Paris to the Austerlitz Station where we had a two hour wait for our south-bound train. This break gave us an opportunity to do a limited amount of sightseeing. We departed at 8.05 p.m. and prepared for the long overnight journey; luckily we had reserved couchettes so were able to get some rest. We breakfasted at Perpignan in hot sun the following morning and at this point we were joined by a party from Lancashire who shared our coach to travel over the Pyrenees into Spain and on to Blanes.

Our first impression of Spain was that it was hot, dry and very beautiful, and of Blanes, hot, dry and very quaint. Blanes is the most westerly resort on the Costa Brava, the least commercialised, and to my mind the most attractive. Our actual stay in Blanes lasted seven days, the rest of the time spent on an excursion along the Costa Brava by motor coach and to Tossa de Mar by private motor boat. Some members of the party also visited Barcelona by train and spent an amusing day there. Unfortunately for some, and fortunately for others, we were unable to visit a bull-fight as there were none in the immediate vicinity. Time passed all too quickly and soon we retraced our steps back through the Pyrenees, across France and the Channel, back to England, without too much trouble. We were all a little sorry to be leaving such a beautiful place; we had enjoyed our holiday and made a lot of friends, both amongst members of the party and in Spain.

YOUTH CRICKET CHALLENGE COMPETITION, 1964

FOR THE FIRST TIME the Association entered a representative team in this Competition, sponsored by the County Cricket Club, and the Gloucestershire Youth Cricket Council. Despite a sound defeat by the G.A.B.C. in the first round the experiment was a successful one and is to be repeated next year.

The Chairman of the Association and several Youth Club members took part in the Reading of the Lessons and during the singing of the Carols every member of the congregation held a lighted taper; all this helped to make the Service most inspiring. CLUB REPORTS

Forthampton and District Youth Club (Mr L. T. Burton)

The special project completed this year was the building, by the members, of the Coffee Bar. It is proving a popular and attractive addition to the club. The project for this year is to be the improvement and decoration of the Powder Room for the girls. The club has taken part in the G.A.Y.C. Competitions and although they did not win they enjoyed entering. The Autumn Fair raised £24 for Club funds. Colin Mayo has been elected as the Members' Council representative to the National Members' Council for 1965/66.

Brockworth Youth Club (Mr R. Merrin)

The highlights of the year were the Summer Fete (£30 profit) and Spring Draw (£40 profit). In the sporting field we had an unbeaten cricket team and regular football and hockey games. The members are also taking part in camping, Youth Hostelling, hiking, cycling, sailing, club visits and most of these activities are mixed. The club has collected for Leprosy Relief, Pantry Scheme for old people, run a Bingo Drive in an Old Folks' Home for its members and have worked with the Gloucester After Prison Care Society. We are getting our new workshop/craft room built and look forward to using it in the autumn, also the members are completing their own designed Coffee Bar.

Little Stoke Youth Club (Mr K. Bagnall)

We have reached our maximum membership of 150 and have a considerable waiting list. The club slogan is, 'You want it—we have it or will get it.' The activities include swimming, beauty culture, fencing, first aid, old people's and children's parties, battington, torchlight football, 6 p.m. to 6 a.m. all night cleaning session, and all the usual club activities. The real pur-

pose of the club is the creation of an atmosphere in which healthy relationships can be formed and the thinking of others as well as ourselves. There has been raised £50 for the Star Homes for Thalidomide Children and next year's target is £54 for the Blind Speaking Library. For the future a continuously increasing range of activities are planned with the prospect of forming a Junior Club for 12 to 15 age group, this will help to bridge the gap between school and work and club.

Dymock Youth Club (Mr A. W. Gale)

We can report a year of steady progress since the official opening of the club last July. Work is still going on to improve the club premises and surrounds but a full range of activities also take place. Sailing, canoeing and hiking are regular features and several members enjoyed a Pony Trekking Holiday last summer.

Newent Youth Club (Mr A. W. Gale)

Our last year in the Youth Centre in Calver Street; the club looks forward to moving to other premises which will allow for further expansion. Several members are taking part in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme and a revival of judo can be reported. Highlight of last summer was an outing to Aberavon and the Pony Trekking Holiday.

Westfields Youth Centre (Mr R. G. Jackson)

The Centre is concerned primarily with individuals who come together in voluntary social association. It has no set programme, but from the association groups develop a common interest and so activities start, such as weight-training, dressmaking, roller skating, drama, canoe building, camping, tape recording, ball-room dancing, social service and many others. Membership is around 250, with an extensive waiting list. The Members' Committee, many of whom are undergoing some form of senior membership training, has a wide influence on the way the "Centre" is managed. This coming year should see the completion of the second stage of our building programme, giving members room to carry out their activities, more freedom for experiment by staff and members and added vitality to all who use the "Centre."

Filton Methodist Youth Club (Mrs I. James)

During 1964 negotiations for a new purpose built Centre have been in progress, and this will be erected in the near future on a plot of land adjoining St Andrew's Methodist Church. The present Youth Hut has for some time been inadequate to cope with all the demands a vigorous Club can make. A stone-laying ceremony and gift day will be held on October 16th, 1965, but Club members have set the pace where fund raising is concerned and during last autumn set themselves a target of £300 to be raised in three months. The sale of Christmas Cards, a Jumble Sale, a Sale of Work and Dances realised a grand total of £400. A further £200 has been transferred from the Club account, therefore, a sum of £600 has been contributed by the Club itself. Further efforts will continue.

It is anticipated that the new Centre will be opened in September, 1966. A very good Club spirit has prevailed throughout the year and an extremely wide range of activities are included in the Club programme; the girls competed in the G.A.Y.C. Netball Competition and represented them in the Regional Finals but unfortunately did not reach the National Finals.

Since National Industrial Endeavour was instituted, several new members have been accepted for each new Course and we have a group of senior boys not only running Adventure Weekends within our own Club but also assisting with Groups further afield, thanks, no doubt, to the high standard of training received while on these Courses.

St Aldate's Youth Club (Mr D. Mills)

Club members have enjoyed a season of varied activities. Considerable enthusiasm has been shown by girl members in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. An important activity in the Club is the interest and consideration given to Old Age Pensioners, especially at Christmas time.

Falcon House Youth Club (Miss M. Totterdell)

The main activity of this Youth Club over the past year has been the re-decoration of the premises. The Coffee Bar is still being built and is reaching the exciting stage. The Table Tennis Section has had a most successful season, winning the Bristol

Association Mixed League and the Area Boys' League. Members are doing odd jobs for old people in the district.

Badminton Road Methodist Youth Club (Mr G. Eagle)

The club has doubled its membership during the past year and now has 130 members, with an average attendance of 90, meeting three nights a week (Wed., Fri., Sun.). The variety of activities has also been increased and now includes weight training, gymnastics and battington. The football team has gained promotion to Division 2 of the Church of England League for the 1965/66 season. Completion of the building extension is eagerly awaited and it is hoped that from September two extra nights (Tues. and Thurs.) will be available for special activities for girls and boys respectively. A part-time paid Assistant Leader is being appointed.

FINANCE

AS ENVISAGED IN MY FINANCIAL REPORT last year, Administrative costs have risen sharply in the year ended 31st March, 1965, in fact by £406. A new Organising Secretary has been appointed recently and I am happy to state that the Executive Committee of the Association have agreed that the Salary Scale recommended by the National Association of Youth Clubs should now apply to this officer. Additional clerical help has been necessary in the Association office to cope with the work required to run a successful programme to assist the Youth of Gloucestershire.

The Two-year Leader Training Course organised by this Association has cost £115 in the year under review, a drop of £73 on the previous year, after allowing for the outstanding grants, and events show a net cost of £198, a rise of £15.

Motor Expenses incurred by the Organising Secretary in the course of his work compare favourably with 1963/64 but it is only too obvious to the Association that replacement of the vehicle will soon be necessary. The increased funds hoped for which might enable us to renew this vehicle are still not available.

The Scott Appeal continues to raise increasing funds, a total of £1,722 having been achieved, which has resulted in a record

sum being transferred to General Funds. This is once again due to the unsparing efforts of our Appeal Secretary, Mrs Nind, but the work involved is reaching proportions where additional help will soon become essential with a consequent rise in administration costs. Our grateful thanks are extended to all those who have contributed to this appeal.

We are again indebted to the Trustees of Smiths Charity for their grant of £200 which enables this Association to give financial help to Clubs to purchase equipment or to undertake schemes of a "Self-help" nature. The following Clubs have benefitted:—

THE MAIN WORK OF THE GLOUCESTERSHIRE ASSOCIATION OF YOUTH CLUBS

- (a) AIM. To help young people through leisure time activities, so to develop their physical, mental and spiritual capacities as to become purposeful individuals and useful members of society.
- (b) RESPONSIBILITY. To have a sense of responsibility towards Clubs affiliated to the Association and to give assistance to them and to the Club Leaders and helpers, both full-time and part-time.
- (e) LIAISON. To act as liaison between the work done in and for Clubs, the Local Education Authority and other Voluntary Organisations. This includes an active participation in the work of the Gloucestershire Standing Conference of Voluntary Youth Organisations.
- (d) **VOLUNTARY SOCIETIES.** To have knowledge of voluntary societies such as Toc H, Rotary Clubs, Inner Wheel, Soroptimists, etc., who might be ready to assist the Association from time to time.
- (e) PROFESSIONAL ORGANISATIONS. To have knowledge of professional organisations which also do work for young people, such as the Central Council of Physical Recreation, The British Drama League, as well as those dealing with the welfare of youth, the Probation Service, etc.
- (f) FUND RAISING. To know, and have contact with, agencies, which may assist the Association in fund raising; industrial concerns; the general public; "Friends of the Association."
- (g) PUBLICITY. To see that the Association and its Clubs receive adequate publicity.
- (h) PLANNED PROGRAMME. To have a planned programme for the coming year's events, ready for publication to Clubs in September.

- (i) **PROJECTS.** To endeavour to plan at least one new piece of work each year. This may include work for a Leaders' or Members' Council, training projects, experimental work, inter-Club activities.
- (j) EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. To have a strong Executive Committee which can guide and help all staff to carry out the policy of the Association with the ability to bring in new people to replace those who leave the Committee and thereby to be constantly on the alert for new trends and ideas in Youth work.
- (k) CLUB DEVELOPMENT. To help to develop the work in the Gloucestershire area to coincide with local needs.

(1) FACILITIES AVAILABLE TO CLUBS :-

- The services of Association Staff. The full-time Organising Secretary and Training Officer spends a great deal of time visiting individual Clubs and is very prepared to give advice and help on Club activities generally, sources of financial assistance and matters affecting Club Leaders and members.
- 2. A 2-year (part-time) Training Course for Club Leaders and helpers.
- 3. Scarves, Ties, Badges and Diaries.
- 4. Participation in local and National Competitions: The Remington Rand Junior Leadership Award; Table Tennis; Netball, etc.
- 5. Ability to nominate representatives to the Gloucestershire Members' Council and National Leaders' Council.
- 6. The National Association Insurance Scheme; Personal accident; sickness; third party; and Employers' Liability Insurances.

- 7. Reduction in fees for training courses or charges at National Holiday Centres, or for literature published by the National Association of Youth Clubs.
- 8. Ability to benefit from the financial assistance offered by various Trusts, both local and National.
- 9. Participation in Club week.
- 10. Assistance with special projects.
- 11. A Certificate of Affiliation.

- 12. Programme Aids—film strips, wall charts, folders on specific Club activities. A Tape Recorder is also available.
- 13. Publications: "Club Leaders' Notes," a bi-monthly publication is sent free of charge.
- 14. Participation in Association events. An Annual Dance is organised in the winter. A pre-season Cricket Coaching Course is held in April and an Association Holiday for members is arranged in August.
