SOME DETAILS OF THE YEAR'S WORK

During the past year the Association has followed a policy designed to encourage Member Clubs to make full use of the facilities we can offer, and the fact that we have now moved to new premises will, we hope, enable us to offer a more effective service. More and more Club Leaders are looking for guidance in the many problems that beset them in a Mixed Youth Club in this day and age. No one who assists with Club work for long will fail to appreciate the unique position of the Leader who has to hold the balance between the Club, its Committee of young people and its Adult Advisory Committee — not an easy task — remembering that many of these Leaders and helpers act in a voluntary capacity.

CLUBS

There are 56 Clubs affiliated with approximately 4,500 members in the Association, made up as follows:—

There have been 7 Clubs closed during the year and 7 new Clubs affiliated during the year.

The following Reports give encouraging evidence of the work being done in Clubs throughout Gloucestershire:—

BADMINTON ROAD METHODIST YOUTH CLUB Downend, Bristol.

The Club has continued to prove a popular meeting place for young people living in the area and to meet a growing demand a junior section has been started, known as The Venturers, for the 12 to 15 age group. The leadership of this section is assisted by some of the senior members.

The total membership is now in excess of 300 and the largest nightly attendance is at the weekly Dance on Fridays when some 250 young people are present.

The Gymnastic Section is proving very popular and this group which is now under the leadership of a former Club member — Mike Sheppard — has given excellent displays at local functions and also at the M.A.Y.C. Display at the Royal Albert Hall.

The Club are renting a farmhouse in South Wales and

during the year considerable work has been done to convert this into a Residential Adventure Centre as it is conveniently situated for walking, climbing, canoeing, caving, etc.

Members have been involved in a number of ways in Community Service and one member has attended an Outward Bound School.

Club members have over the past year continued to take a keen interest in all the activities of the Club and have taken part in the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs' Members' Council Week-ends and Competitions. Congratulations must go to Roger Davies on gaining a County Colour for Football through the G.A.B.C. Collections have been organised and donations made to the Aberfan Disaster Fund,

Dr. Barnados Home, the Cheshire Homes, and the Old Peoples Welfare. A future, regular feature of the Club programme, will be entertainment for the "over sixties" in the village. We were sorry to lose Miss M. Brown, who assisted the Club so ably and have now welcomed Mrs. B. Clark as assistant Club Leader, who is working wonderfully well, especially with keep-fit and crafts.

Now that we, in Blakeney, have realised our ambition to build our own Youth Centre, our policy is not to stand still but to expand both membership and building-wise, so that the purpose of the Youth Service will be carried on in many forms of activity.

BROCKWORTH YOUTH CENTRE, Gloucester

During the past year the Club has made positive efforts to re-establish itself. Membership has reached the stage when "House Full" notices appear for some functions. Fund raising events have already been success-

fully run, and more are planned for the future. Taking part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme is another way in which members are helping the community.

An experiment is planned for this summer. The Club will remain open for most of the school holiday period. This normally being "the weeks of boredom" for those members attending school.

DYMOCK YOUTH CLUB

Future projects include the installation of a Coffee Bar, the formation of an Archery group and the possibility of sailing at Tewkesbury.

ELMSCROFT YOUTH CLUB, Gloucester

The Club meets two nights a week (Tuesdays and Thursdays) in Elmscroft Community Centre. Two other evenings a week are organised externally for specialist activities such as Badminton, Swimming and Football training.

During the past year there has been a large recruitment drive with the membership rising from eight to around seventy and an average evening attendance of 35 to 45. The membership is predominantly boys 15 to 17 as the Club programme was initially geared to sporting pursuits.

This is Elmscroft's first year of affiliation to the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs and already members are taking part in the activities provided by the Association. Two members, D. Norman (Youth Chairman) and J. Shackleton (Club Secretary) attended a recent Members' Council Weekend and have expressed great interest. A team entered the Quiz Competition, getting as far as the area final before losing to Stoke Gifford Youth Club. The Five-a-Side Football team went one better in winning their Competition and are looking forward to the South West Regional Finals.

The recently formed Motor Cycle Group have just finished building their "Workshop" and hopes are high for the future as long as we do not get evicted from the Club rooms because of the noise.

ELM TREE YOUTH CLUB, Bishop's Cleeve

ST. STEPHEN'S YOUTH CLUB, Cheltenham.

The membership of the Club is approximately 62, of which 46 are at school and 16 are working and the average attendance is 42 per week. The Club has only been affiliated to the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs since February 1966 and during this year Miss Betty Jackson and I have received the G.A.Y.C. Two-Year Part-time Leadership Training Certificate. The Club has also supported the Association's Carol Service and has entered teams in all of the Competitions held by G.A.Y.C. Many activities have taken place within the Club including a summer Ramble, a Halloween Party, a Christmas Party and a trip to London, also a Dance. A studio has been rebuilt and redecorated by the members and is now open for any form of handicraft.

The Club has also taken part in various inter-Club activities such as an exercise organised by the Army Youth team, a 25 mile night hike with other local Clubs, a visit to Forthampton Youth Club and a joint trip to Birmingham for ice-skating and Ten Pin Bowling. The Club's future project is the building of a chalet in the grounds of St. Stephen's Church Hall for the sole use of Club members thus enabling the Club to open on any night of the week, instead of only one night as at present. The members have already raised £37 towards the total cost of £150.

CLUB WEEK 1966

Club Week was a greater success this year, than in the past, with 19 Clubs participating and a total sum of £766-4-6d being raised. Of this 70% is retained by Clubs for their own funds, the remainder being divided between the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs and the National Association of Youth Clubs which, in turn, assist towards finances for their particular work. With the development of Leader participation and planning, increased support for Leaders' Meetings is expected in the coming year.

CANDLELIGHT CAROL SERVICE

The statement that there is now no place for Youth Clubs in to-day's society has been with us for the last several years, but I seem to have heard it even more so during the last twelve months since I have been Chairman of the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs' Members' Council.

I am glad to report however, that during this period, we in the Members' Council, have the opposite experience. We have attracted more and more representatives from different Clubs, until we are in the unfortunate position of having more applications than places.

Three main Residential Week-ends have been held, two at Sandywell Park and the last one at Cowley Manor. Many

interesting people have been invited to speak at these week-ends, on a very wide range of subjects, and have been enthusiastically received by the members.

The highlights were as follows:—

November Residential Meeting: "Tips for Swinging Parties" The Council divided into groups for programming, catering and decorating, with Mr. M. Barnsley, Mrs. J. Butterworth and Mr. S. Martin respectively, as advisers, the whole culminating in a successful party.

FINANCE

As will be seen from the Accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1967, administration costs have again risen as anticipated. The office staff have coped very well with the volume of work but there is now no surplus capacity available. Any further pressure on the office must involve extra staff.

During the year under review it became essential to find alternative office accommodation and the Association was most fortunate in being able to complete negotiations for the lease of 2A St. Aldate Street. This involved considerable expense but it was vital for the smooth working of the office and all essential details were completed whereby the new premises were brought into use as and from 1st February 1967. The lease cost £375 plus legal expenses and additionally various equipment etc. was considered necessary and was purchased. All who have visited these new offices confirm that it was a good move.

Our motor vehicle is quite a source of expense but an absolute essential requirement.

The Association agreed to underwrite the Dance held in June 1966 by the Members' Council. Unfortunately this was not a successful event and involved a loss of approximately £82.

The Executive Committee also agreed to make an annual advance of £20 to the Members' Council to help their finances.

The ever successful Scott County Appeal goes from strength to strength and in the year under review has received donations totalling £1799 14 9d plus Covenanted Subscriptions of £201 15 0d and tax refunded on these of £110 17 5d, a grand total of £2112 7 2d. Once again we are deeply indebted to Mrs. G. O. Nind our Appeals Secretary who has been untiring in her efforts. We must all wonder how much longer the "Law of Increasing Returns", will continue to operate in the Association's favour.

The Trustees of Smith's Charity have again most generously provided us with a Grant of £200 for use in giving financial help to Clubs affiliated to this Association. The following Clubs have received assistance during the past year:—
