SOME DETAILS OF THE YEAR'S WORK

The Association continues to expand its activities and opportunities offered to members of affiliated Clubs and this year has included two new fields of work, i.e., "Blueprint for Living" and the Christmas Cracker Bazaar. Competitions have attracted an increasing number of competitors, indicating that these particular activities are meeting a need in the county. The Association, this year, published a Year Book of Events, together with a Diary, thereby helping the Leader to plan the Club programme for the year.

It is hoped that the following Reports will be of interest to all those who read the Annual Report:

ST. STEPHEN'S YOUTH CLUB

The most important item to record in this year's Report is that Elizabeth Beadnell, Chairman of our Members' Committee, was selected to represent Gloucestershire in the National Finals of the Remington Junior Leadership Award. This wonderful achievement came at the end of one of the most successful years in the Club's history, when over £200 was raised to buy a garden chalet which was built by the members themselves and furnished as a Club lounge.

In addition to normal Club activities, dances, parties and brass rubbing expeditions, a new group called "Mid-week Theatre" has been formed for reading, listening to and discussing plays. Outings have been arranged to Windsor Castle, The Promenade Concerts, London at Christmas, and Berkeley Castle.

BROCKWORTH YOUTH CLUB, Gloucester

We, at Brockworth, realize that the present time is most testing for Youth Service in this country and we are endeavouring to play our part in ensuring that the Service keeps alert to, and meets, the needs of the Community.

FILTON METHODIST YOUTH CLUB

After many years of waiting, the Club moved into the new purpose built St. Andrews Youth Centre in April of last year. The members having worked for some time through various efforts raised well over £1,000 towards the building fund.

Membership increased and has continued at a steady 186 with an average attendance of 100.

During the summer months, Tennis, League Rounders and Cricket were played. The Cricket team won the South Gloucestershire League Trophy, having attained top place in the League. The Club has also participated in various adventure and sports events, also the Federation Road Relay Race.

After a shorter than usual summer break, netball and football were re-started, in addition to many indoor activities. The local Football Table League was entered for the first time and the Club finished in second place.

A sponsored walk was organised recently in aid of the Centre Building Fund and over £300 in promised money is now being collected by members who walked 30 miles throughout the night.

The Club celebrates its 25th anniversary this year and after a quarter of a century of Youth work in the area, it looks forward to the continued success that it is envisaged the new Youth Centre will afford.

"BLUEPRINT FOR LIVING"

"Blueprint For Living" is a new venture within the work of the Association for YOUNG ADULTS between the age of 17-21 and consists of four Residential Week-ends—three at local Conference Houses and one in London. This year twenty young adults enrolled for the Course, the AIM of which is to increase an understanding of human relationships and is seen as an opportunity:—

- to stimulate and arouse curiosity in the world of ideas
- to provide an opportunity for learning about the structure and working of the communities and society in which we live
- to develop a greater awareness of oneself in relation to others and to help in learning ways by which mature and productive relationships are fostered
- to provide a maturity in outlook so that the problems of growth can be mastered.

The students reaction to, and thoughts on, the current Course have been expressed by a member in the following summary:—

"At the beginning of this Course, the general feeling was 'What are we going to do?' This was enhanced by the apparent lack of a time table. This, together with the element of surprise and even shock at one of the venues held the Course together. It was an experimental type of Course as far as we, the students, were concerned and we just kept going. If difficult situations arose, we tried to combat them as best we could.

Although each week-end was different, we always had 'Saturday Night Out', this in itself was a surprise because we were never told where we were going, until we were en route, and they included a visit to the theatre, a restaurant and a cinema.

The aim of the Course was to promote a better understanding between ourselves and of why we need each other to live in this world and it was done in various ways;

discussion groups, a survey, a role-play, working in groups and trying to hammer a situation out and arrive at a group answer.

The success of the Course was shown at the last week-end when to the question 'Would you recommend this Course to other people?' we all replied 'Yes'. A suggestion was also put forward that a follow-up week-end, or Course, be organised next year, showing that the Course had been a success for all of us."

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING & RESIDENTIAL CONFERENCE 1967

The 26th Annual General Meeting of the Association was held at St. Mary's College of Education, Cheltenham, on 10th June, 1967, and was attended by an increased number of Leaders, members and friends. Lt.-Col. P. B. Carroll took the Chair and a Vice-President, Lt.-Col. A. Lloyd-Baker was asked to present the Awards. Colonel Lloyd-Baker, in his address, referred to his connections with the Association in its early days and pointed out that it had an even more important role to play within the Youth Service of the County to-day and in the future.

The Annual General Meeting concluded with the showing of the film "STRESS", introduced by Miss Sowerby, headmistress of Eildon School, Cheltenham, in support of Mental Health Week.

The fifth Annual Conference followed the A.G.M. and was held at Sandywell Park Conference House, the theme of

which was "Let's Break Out . . . attended by Leaders, Advisory Committee and Members' Committee members. The Conference looked at three ways in which a Youth Club could ask "Let's Break Out . . . into :—

- (1) work with handicapped young people
Speaker: Mr. G. D. C. Tudor, M.A., Principal of the Star Centre for Youth, Ullenwood Manor, near Cheltenham;
- (2) working with the older Club Members
Speaker: Miss M. Ashworth, Assistant Youth Leader, Widnes Youth Centre, Lancashire;
- (3) saving Wildlife
Speaker: Col. M. G. H. Henley, C.B.E., Regional Officer of the World Wildlife Fund.

The Conference also provided an opportunity for all sections of Club life to take part in discussions and to learn from each other the problems which arise in Clubs to-day.

The Annual Conference has now become one of the most popular events in the Association's calendar.

CLUB WEEK 1967

Club Week goes from strength to strength and this year 18 Clubs participated and raised a total of £620/17/3d. During this week Club members work for the benefit of their Club and their Local and National Associations and they are to be congratulated on their efforts, particularly the following Clubs for the outstanding amounts raised :—

The fourth Annual Carol Service, held in conjunction with the Diocesan Youth Committee took place at Gloucester Cathedral. Once again this great place of worship was filled to capacity with young people and adults who were gathered together to recapture the spirit of Christmas. The Carols, the Lessons, the Anthems and the lighted tapers all played their part in making the Service a very moving experience. The Association is deeply indebted to Mr. John Sanders the Organist; to the Gloucester Christmas Orchestra, conducted by Mr. Tony Hewitt-Jones; to the young people and Clergy who read the Lessons and, of course, to the Bishop of Gloucester and to all those who helped each in their own way. The collection was divided between the Association's work for handicapped young people and Diocesan work overseas.

LEADERS' MEETING

Club Leaders from all over the County were brought together at a meeting held at the Association Offices. This proved to be a very popular occasion, the outcome of which was the request for further meetings on a regional basis.

CHAIRMEN'S MEETING

A meeting was held for the Chairmen of affiliated Clubs on "An Introduction to the Work of the Association". Considerable interest was shown and a request for future meetings was made for the purpose of discussing relevant matters of mutual concern.

CRYSTAL PALACE 1967

The Association's Table Tennis team had the privilege of representing the South West Region in the National Association of Youth Clubs' Finals at Crystal Palace having defeated teams from Bristol, Somerset, Wiltshire, Devonshire, Dorset and Herefordshire. The team did extremely well defeating Scotland and lost to Buckinghamshire in the semi-final. This is the first time the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs have had a team in the National Finals.

REMINGTON JUNIOR LEADERSHIP AWARD

Elizabeth Beadnell of St. Stephen's Youth Club, Cheltenham, was chosen to take part in this Award held by the National Association of Youth Clubs in London in March.

Although Elizabeth did not gain a place in the Award she obviously enjoyed the experience and the following is an extract from her report :—

"The first day was rather tense, as we were all trying too hard to speak, knowing that every word was important and when the day was over and the winner was known, the relief surpassed the personal disappointment at not being the chosen one. The following day we really began to 'live it up'—a reception at The Savoy where we were presented with a spray of orchids, followed by a visit to the Theatre; a perfect ending to a wonderful day. Altogether I had a lovely time and would like to thank the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs for making it possible. I am only sorry I did not bring the Award to Gloucester."

Note: This is a National Award presented by the firm of Remington Electric Shavers Ltd., to young people who have shown outstanding qualities of leadership in their Clubs and local Associations.

CHRISTMAS CRACKER BAZAAR

This year for the first time the Association took part in the National Association of Youth Clubs' Christmas Cracker Bazaar, held at the Chelsea Town Hall, London, in November. The Stall, which was entitled, "Gloucestershire Crafts and Industries" provided a wide range of goods for sale. The

organisation and setting up of this Stall entailed a tremendous amount of work, including fund-raising activities, which were undertaken by a small Ladies Committee, and the Association is deeply indebted to them; to the affiliated Clubs for their gifts and money contributions; to local Industries who donated, or provided, goods on a sale or return basis and to the numerous other kind friends who helped with transport and in many other ways. The Christmas Cracker Bazaar, as a whole, proved to be a great success, breaking all previous financial records and the Gloucestershire Association felt that their efforts had in some way contributed to this achievement.

MEMBERS' COUNCIL REPORT, 1967-68

During the past year the Members' Council has gained even more support from Clubs due, no doubt, to the wide variety of programmes offered. The number of Clubs represented at each weekend has risen from 12 to 19 and again this year we have had to turn down members wishing to attend — on an average one third of the total acceptances.

Four weekends have been arranged, three at Sandywell Park and one at Cowley Manor, and the highlights of each weekend have been as follows :

November Residential Weekend

Taking as its theme "Society's Misfits Today" we considered "Those Detained" — Approved Schools and Borstals, introduced by Mr. A. B. Robertson, Governor of H.M. Prison,

Leyhill; "Those Unattached" — young people not in direct contact with Youth Service, with Mr. George Galt (formally Detached Youth Worker, Kingswood); "Those Addicted" — drugs and alcohol, with Mr. Derek Cox, Youth Worker, Tower Hamlets Youth Project, London; and finally we discussed "what are we prepared to do for these young people".

This weekend certainly gave us a new outlook to our Clubs and made us more aware of those around us.

January Residential Weekend

A new range of interest was covered at this weekend. Mrs. E. Dow introduced "Social Etiquette" and answered our questions and indecisions, which was then followed by a Formal Dinner. After Dinner the film "Question 7" was shown and we realised how fortunate we are in this country, compared with East Germany.

Finally at this weekend we looked at "West Indian Teenagers Today", introduced by Mr. M. Douglas, and in the discussions answered some of our thoughts on the immigration situation and how we, in Youth Clubs, may help to integrate young people from other parts of the world.

March Residential Weekend

PHAB that is work with Physically Handicapped and Able-bodied young people, was introduced by Lady Jean Mackenzie, Vice-Chairman of the National Association of Youth Clubs and Miss Susan Bush, a member who had attended a PHAB Week.

Mr. Adrian Smith introduced "Education Today" and gave

the members the opportunity of expressing their own opinions etc., on the education they had received, or were receiving.

May Residential Weekend

Members were given the choice of participating in two of the following activities provided at this weekend: Brass-rubbing; tennis; badminton; treasure-hunt and rhythm and music, followed by discussions on the National Members' Council theme "Communicate 68". During these discussions we thought about the role of the adult committee, the Leaders, the Members' Committee and the members and how we communicate at all levels in a wide range of ways. The weekend finished with the Annual General Meeting of the Members' Council, during which the officers for 1968-1969 were elected.

I feel I cannot end this report without thanking all the Officers, the members of the Executive Committee, the Association office staff, all the Speakers, Wardens of the Conference House, and many others who have given so much of their time and enthusiasm to the success of the Members' Council Weekends and last, but not least, the Club members who have attended and given so much.

On behalf of my fellow officers I would like to say how much we have enjoyed our year of office and I am sure this experience has helped us all to accept and carry our responsibility, to think of others before self, to play our part in the Club, our homes, at work and in many other ways. Our thanks to all members of Members' Council.
