#### ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The 28th Annual General Meeting of the Association took place at St. Mary's College for Education, Cheltenham, on 28th June, 1969, attended by a large gathering of Leaders, members and friends.

The Chairman of the Association (Mr. A. D. Mentz) welcomed two Vice-Presidents to the meeting, Miss M. E. Miles and Lt.-Col. P. B. Carroll, and invited Col. Carroll to take the Chair. After the formal business of the meeting had been conducted, Col. Carroll invited the Speaker, The Hon. Mrs. C. A. Morrison (Vice-President of the Wiltshire Association of Youth Clubs) to present the various Trophies, Awards, Certificates and Badges. The meeting concluded with an interesting talk, by Mrs. Morrison, on future trends in the Youth Service.

#### CANDLELIGHT CAROL SERVICE

More than 1600 people filled the Cathedral on the occasion of the sixth Annual Carol Service held jointly with the Diocesan Youth Committee. The Christmas message was given by the Canon Missioner, the Rev. T. Eric Evans, based on the significance of Col. J. P. Carne's Cross which is in the Cathedral. He contrasted Christmas in this country with the type of Christmas endured by Col. Carne, in solitary confinement, during the Korean War. The organ, played by Mr. John Sanders, was supplemented by the Christmas Orchestra, conducted by Mr. Tony Hewitt-Jones. Four members of County Youth Clubs, Jennifer Hacker (Stoke Gifford Y.C.); Eleanor Garrett and Allan Bateman (Berkeley Y.C.) and Patrick McDermot (Down Ampney Y.C.) read the Lessons and two guitarists, Veronica Smith and Richard Potts played "Lord of the Dance" and "Every Star Shall Sing A Carol". Lessons were also read by The Bishop of Gloucester, the Rt. Rev. Basil Guy and a member of St. John Ambulance Brigade. The Association is indebted to all concerned with the organisation of this event. The proceeds of the collection will be shared by the Association for their work with physically handicapped young people and the Diocesan Youth Committee for charities of their choice.

#### PHAB

For those not conversant with the name PHAB it simply means Physically Handicapped and Able Bodied. The following litems will give you some idea of the work of this Association in this most worthwhile and expanding field.

The life of the physically handicapped is all too often a lonely one, cut off from the community and society. It is our aim to make it much less so. At present we are limited to a week or two a year when we meet together on courses, either in this country or abroad, we would wish it to be a fifty-two weeks a year event.

We see no reason why the physically handicapped should not be a part of and not apart from community and society, and it is our hope for the future that we can help bring this about

We realise that there may be difficulties but as all who have attended PHAB courses know, the will IS THERE, we only need now to find the way.

We know that the number of young people who volunteer for this and any other work of a similar nature often exceeds the jobs available. We know also the determination of the physically handicapped to make this scheme succeed, so too are we. We are certain that there will be considerable support too from the people of Gloucestershire to help this Association set the wheels in motion to make PHAB fifty-two

weeks of the year a reality. Then we would perhaps have reached the point where discrimination was no longer necessary, and we could then perhaps call it UZ and that would then really be PHAIB-U-LOUS.

#### EASTER IN PARIS, 22nd - 31st MARCH 1970 Paris PHAB 1970

As with all Phab courses this one too contained routine and highlights—things which linger in one's memory and things which are lost.

Bob Ashman and myself arrived in London on the Saturday, 21st March, and walked into Devonshire Street House with thoughts of a night of "relaxation" in London prior to our departure for Paris on the Monday. At Devonshire Street House we bumped into another PHAIB group from Sheffield, and were invited to join in with their weekend programme. We toured London by coach and by special permission were able to see the changing of the guard from the courtyard of Buckingham Palace.

On the Sunday we said "Goodbye" to our Sheffield friends and "hello" to the group of us going to Paris. That evening Miss Robinson, M.B.E. (better known to PHAB as "Mum") welcomed us and introduced everybody to everybody. Having completed introductions we were able to proceed with the first stage of our holiday—the plan of departure. All luggage was loaded aboard the vehicles and people allocated places most suitable to them. We then unloaded everybody and went to bed—safe in the knowledge that we would not be disturbed until 4.30 a.m. next morning. The value of this practice load was obvious when we were able to load wheel-chairs and people in remarkably quick time.

We were off without a hitch from London to Dover -

straight into the Townsend Ferry—priority treatment again. Once aboard the ferry we unloaded and went below—and then came the call—"Captain's compliments and would we like to go up to the bridge".

We set off to the bridge and completely demoralised the crew by taking the wheel. With others of us stationed at the radar scanners and others still keeping an eye ahead—through the Captain's binoculars—we arrived safely at Calais. Having passed through customs we proceeded through France to Paris where our arrival was slightly inconvenienced by a dispute involving French haulage drivers—but with the assistance of several gendarmes we eventually arrived at "I'ecole nationale pour handicapes moteurs" which was to be our Paris Home for the next ten days.

E.N.O. is a government establishment which exists as both a school (or college) and hostel for those able to work away from Garche. Having settled in to our "home" we were able to contemplate the days ahead.

#### Highlights of the week included :-

- An introduction to French cooking—bread and wine with every meal—garnished salads and cooked meats. Our first taste of Snails. Eugh!
- Tea at the British Embassy—shown around the embassy by Emma, a pretty blonde girl who, when describing some of Sir Winston Churchill's paintings, casually said "My Grandfather painted those". Having tea and a chat with her father who was Mr. Christopher Soames—the British Ambassador.
- Visit to an African game reserve near Paris—the equivalent of Longleat.
- 4. Painting in the small villages near Paris.

- Paris by night and racing six times round the Arc de Triumphe in a Mini-bus giving our own rendering of a police siren.
- 6. Trying to get into an underground car park on the Champs Elysee and finding the entrance sign to be too low for the ambulance (the Mary Lou) STUCK!
- A visit to the Louvre to see paintings including "La Joconde" (Mona Lisa).
- A visit to the French opera—must be seen to be appreciated (Le Coc d'Or).
- 9. A visit to the Chateau de Versailles.
- Let loose in the Magasin de Louvre—one of the local department stores— and a taste of French beer and French berets.
- Church on the Sunday (Easter Sunday at the British Embassy Church). Surprising the number of English people who seemed to gather at this Church for the morning service. Very nostalgic.
- 12. And of course the Eiffel Tower—wheelchairs and all.
- This, then, was the programme—behind each day a tale—incidents never to be forgotten.
- It was bath night for Nabs and Taffy-but why didn't they take their clothes off first.

"Let's have a Sing-song" and who knew that Alan, one of the drivers, had such a beautiful voice—or that Colin could give such a rendering of "Dorset be beautiful wherever yer go"—or that Taffy could stand on a chair with a bit of support, and give a song in Welsh which brought tears to our eyes.

Party night—nothing but coca-cola and a record player but with French guests from a local hospital and English girls from a visiting school party, the atmosphere was great.

Taffy saying something he shouldn't-and before long he

had enough talc, perfume and deodorant to last a lifetime—

But most of all one remembers the people—it's them that count. Variety is the spice of life—and what a variety. Lorry drivers and public school, youth workers and draughtsmen, lower class, middle class, upper class and no class. Who cares? Everybody is needed and feels needed.

#### RAISING THE MONEY

Terry Clark is physically handicapped but that was no deterrent when funds were needed for others perhaps in worse circumstances than he. On Spring Bank Holiday Monday, along with 63 other young people, he started out on a fifteen mile walk to raise money for . . . yes . . . the physically handicapped. He had a bit of a job obeying the rallying cry "Put your best foot forward", he hadn't a best foot as such, but he put one in front of the other eighty thousand times from ten o'clock in the morning, on through the gruelling heat of the day, never resting for fear of not getting up again, until eight hours later at six in the evening, he breasted the rise and walked to the door of Filton Methodist Youth Club accompanied the last few hundred yards by two of the walk organisers, and to the cheers of the other 63 who had done the journey before him.

Andy Millman too is physically handicapped. He spends most of his life in a wheelchair, but provided someone was prepared to propel him he too was game for the distance, and he made it. For the last twelve miles Chris Bonnard of Patchway Youth Club was the engine providing the power. Chris now knows why wheelchairs are sometimes referred to as "Push Chairs", he pushed, pulled and held back, "on hills only of course", Andy to the finishing point, never stop-

ping, not even hrough the afternoon heat of Stoke Gifford, just in case he might not get on the way again.

Longer distances have been covered on sponsored walks, far greater numbers have taken part in them, many more pounds per head have been collected, in fact you might find this hard to believe BUT SOME WALKED THE WHOLE DISTANCE AND THEY HAD NOT BEEN SPONSORED AT ALL, NO NOT EVEN FOR A PENNY. Who knows, perhaps even at this late date someone, somewhere, may feel that their effort is worthy of something more than the satisfaction of competing and completing, to say nothing of the blisters which some felt they HAD to have if they were to get even the remotest idea of what others suffered tenfold and permanently.

There were many more stories of the walk worthy of mention. The excellent organisation, the fact that all finished, the co-operation of the police, who like the good referee watched the action but did not interfere with the play. The most generous free use of one of Sparkes' coaches of Bristol which, needless to say, was greatly appreciated by all. The co-operative public filling the constantly emptying squash containers, the old lady, herself handicapped, delighted that the walkers had chosen her door to sit by for a break, she was so pleased to have company and so much all at once, as she said "so jolly". The photograph included in this Report shows her delight. She will be even more delighted we hope with her copy of this Report and an enlarged photograph to follow.

What was it all in aid of? PHAB of course. The week at the end of July at Ullenwood, and what a night it promises to be when the walkers who helped raise the money to make the week possible, meet those for whom it WAS MADE pos-

#### LEADERS' MEETINGS

Meetings for leaders, or representatives of affiliated clubs in the South of the county have been held regularly and increasingly well attended under the chairmanship of Mr. J. An experiment involving joint meetings with Members' Council officers has recently been introduced and with the advent of a newly formed Young Adult group it would indicate that the amalgamation of these three bodies could very well be the pattern for the future. #### CLUB WEEK 1969

Twelve clubs participated in Club Week and raised a total of £553 9s. 6d. Of this amount 70% was retained by the club to be used for its own benefit and the remaining 30% is equally divided between the National Association of Youth Clubs and the Gloucestershire Association of Youth Clubs, thus helping to maintain the services provided for clubs. CONGRATULIATIONS yet again to the members of Down Ampney Youth Club who for the third year in succession collected the highest amount per member. CONGRATULIATIONS also to the members of Berkeley Youth Club who were very close runners-up. Nine other clubs jointly affiliated with this and the Bristol Association also participated. We

#### CHRIST CHURCH HANHAM YOUTH CLUB— VAGRANT PATROLS

Friday—Midnight strikes, and another team of young people set forth. They are looking for vagrants (not the romanticised tramp) ignored by the majority of society. They will search derelict houses (perhaps the most dangerous places); empty abandoned schools; along the river bank; and the deserted bus-station. When a 'customer' is found he (or very occasionally, she) will be offered soup and sandwiches and some cigarettes. Then the talking starts, sometimes the most important part of the whole operation. If clothes or blankets are needed an address is given where these can be obtained the next afternoon. This contact may be the start to going to a hostel, then a job. Some accept help—some refuse and only accept what is given.

After three hours of searching and meeting and talking the young people return to Hanham, usually cold and tired, but grateful that they at least have a bed and a home to return to
