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"YG offers an increasing range of opportunities"

Since its formation some twelve years ago Young Gloucestershire has become one of the leading youth support organisations in the country as well as one of the largest. Expansion has enabled us to offer an increasing range of 'social education and personal development' opportunities to an increasing number of young people and our Board has confirmed that they wish this growth to continue. But, of course, organisational growth does not just happen - it has to be driven and depends on a number of factors.

Over the last few years there have been some new opportunities to find funding for services for which we had identified a need, such as the National Lottery which is supporting InfoBUZZ and European Objective 3 which supports our New Start Network. Additionally the Government has initiated and funded schemes for young people; for example New Deal and Millennium Volunteers. The expertise and credibility that Young Gloucestershire has built up over the years has enabled us to take advantage of these opportunities to ensure that the young people of Gloucestershire have the benefits that they bring.

Brian Parker, our Chief Executive, has taken the lead in identifying the opportunities, preparing the bids and setting up the infrastructure to deliver the services. The managers have then taken responsibility for preparing the delivery team, liaising with the appropriate organisations to reach the client base,

seeking additional financial support and, of course, ensuring that a quality service is

The people delivering the service are a skilled and committed team who have shown themselves to be a credit both to Young Gloucestershire and to the young people of the county. They are backed by a small number of people providing the administrative and other support functions, without which the organisation could not operate.

It is the interaction of all these people, each using their own particular skills, that has built up the reputation of Young Gloucestershire and helped to bring us to where we are today. They will also be the people who take the organisation forward. identifying new opportunities, devising new ways of meeting identified needs and seeking ways to fund their ideas.

However, in addition to the various sources of financial support for specific

services we, like many charities, depend very much on the generosity of numerous individuals and organisations that have provided us with help in many forms. County, District and Parish Councils, a number of charitable trusts, private companies, public bodies and individuals making donations are vital to our survival and my sincere thanks go to all of them.

Our Board of Directors has the responsibility for determining the future direction of the organisation and for providing support to the delivery teams. They give their time and expertise freely and without financial reward and provide essential guidance to help the successful development of Young Gloucestershire.

Whilst possibly not an essential element for success, there is no doubt that luck has often played a part. It is our luck to have a combination of skilled staff, generous sponsors and a supportive Board of Directors, a combination that will help us through the next stage of growth.

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Mission Statement

Young Gloucestershire - serving young people of the county through the provision of learning opportunites that focus on their social education and personal development.

Young Gloucestershire 1945 to 2000

The objectives for which the Association was established: "to help and educate boys and young men and girls and young women especially, but not exclusively, through their leisure time activities so as to develop their physical, mental and spiritual capabilities so that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and members of society and their condition of life may be improved".

Young Gloucestershire's vision is to be the leading voluntary youth organisation in the county with whom other organisations and agencies want to be associated and support in the delivery of high quality programmes for young people.

Young Gloucestershire's mission - serving young people through the provision of learning opportunities that focus on social education and personal development.

Young Gloucestershire is an independent youth work charity working with young people aged between 11 and 25 years.

Young Gloucestershire's aims are:

- to provide services and facilities to foster, develop and support clubs for young people, particularly in areas of need;
- to provide young people and youth workers with access to regional and national opportunities via UK Youth, the National Association of Clubs for Young People, the Prince's Trust and Millennium Volunteers
- to enable all young people in the county to be able to access facilities and programmes;
- to deliver Prince's Trust Volunteers programmes and Millennium Volunteers opportunities throughout the county;
- to provide residential personal development courses for young employees;
- to work in partnership with other agencies to increase and enhance the range of services and opportunities for young people.

Young Gloucestershire is based in Gloucester but is able to access and operate from training bases throughout the county, and also has three mobile projects - InfoBUZZ, Roadshow and a Mobile Environmental Task Force.

Generic youth work through a network of over 90 youth groups to whom we offer access to the programmes of both UK Youth and the National Association of Clubs for Young People, as well as an annual programme of events, activities and training provided at county and unit level. Additional specific projects include:

- Roadshow, a mobile youth service supporting and developing youth clubs
- RoadRunners, a practical driving programme for 16 year-olds
- Young Citizens, a crime reduction and personal safety programme for 14/15 year-olds



InfoBUZZ

- a mobile drug education project for young people throughout the county;
- based in a converted coach which is equipped with information, displays, video equipment and multi-media computers; staffed by a team of experienced project workers who work hard at maintaining an accurate knowledge base around drugs, alcohol and health-related issues;
- a service that works with young people in formal and informal settings including schools, colleges, youth centres, voluntary youth organisations, prisons etc;
- sessions can be run on or off the bus, utilising halls, gyms or classrooms to deliver group work activities which complement those taking place on the vehicle.

Prince's Trust Volunteers

- a unique training programme designed for young people aged between 16 and 25 years from a variety of backgrounds (employed, unemployed and those between phases of education) with an opportunity for personal development while helping to meet the needs of the community through voluntary work;
- the training programmes are organised by trained team leaders (both employed and seconded from business) with constant quality controls and evaluation processes.

Foundation for Work

- a progressive series of three residential personal development courses for apprentices and trainees;
- programmes of outdoor development activities are used to develop key skills; teamwork, problem solving, communications and improving own learning, as well as helping with selfconfidence, self-esteem and motivation:

New Deal Options

Young Gloucestershire, with its partners, has been awarded the contract for the Voluntary and Environmental Task Force options for Gloucester City, Cheltenham and Tewkesbury Boroughs and the Forest of Dean until March 2001. and has worked with as many

organisations as possible from those sectors in our goal to help young people back to employment.

Millennium Volunteers

- is a new UK-wide initiative to encourage more 16 to 24 year-olds to volunteer their time for the benefit of others;
- Young Gloucestershire is promoting Millennium Volunteers throughout the county and enabling young people to gain an "MV for their CV";
- MV is designed to empower young people to undertake activities on local issues which they really care about, using their skills and interests as a starting point.

New Start Network

- is a pre-Gateway/foundation programme aimed at 16 to 24 year-olds (together with 13-16 year-old mums-tobe) who are unable for a variety of reasons to access mainstream training, education or employment;
- focuses on specific target groups such as ex-offenders, homeless, disabled, ethnic minorities, those suffering from addiction or with learning difficulties;

- is a flexible scheme with individual programmes, achievable goals and substainable support;
- Young Gloucestershire is the lead partner among 13 organisations offering a variety of short courses to develop the trainees' confidence and motivation.

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Overview of the Year's Finances 2000-2001

The Youth Development Team is responsible for the development, planning and delivery of the generic youth work with Young Gloucestershire. A restricted fund has been created by a grant from Gloucestershire County Council of £28,600. Further grants and donations were received from Smith's Charity, CHK Charities, BBC Children in Need, District and Borough Councils and the NACYP.

InfoBUZZ, a mobile drug education project, is now benefiting from pledged funding over three years from the National Lottery Charities Board. The first year's grant is £89,085. Other donations were received from Smith's Charity and service level agreements from the Gloucestershire LEA and the Prison Service.

Millennium Volunteers is a DfEE-funded initiative which contracts Young Gloucestershire to develop volunteering opportunities over three years. We are now 18 months into this work which is progressing well.

The Prince's Trust Volunteers personal development programme is funded through training fees from the FECF via GlosCAT, New Deal via the Employment Service and specific donations have been received from Smith's Charity and the Barnwood Trust.

Income 2000-2001

Sadly New Deal - Voluntary Sector and Environmental Task Force - is no longer part of our work. Young Gloucestershire was unsuccessful in its bid to deliver these programmes for a further period - the Employment Service preferred to work with an out-of-county commercial business. This meant that Young Gloucestershire had to lose ten valuable members of staff who we believed had worked as a very effective team and made a real difference in the lives of many young people.

On the positive side we are hoping to respond to a real need we identified through New Deal - that of providing vocational skills, workshops and training that will prove to be a route into employment.

Young Gloucestershire has taken over the leadership of the New Start Network

from the Link Group. NSN is a pre-Gateway/foundation programme aimed at 16-24 year-olds who are unable for a variety of reasons to access current Government training, education programmes or gain employment. Substantial funding for these programmes is being provided by the European Social Fund GB

Further grants were raised to pay for replacement windows at our new centre, 2 Heathville Road, Gloucester, including a grant from Gloucestershire County Council.

We are fortunate to have such a broad range of funders that, as well as the above, also include many individuals, businesses, county, district and parish councils, local and national trusts. Our sincere thanks to them all for their support.

The Youth Development Team

The Youth Development Team is responsible for the development, planning and delivery of the generic youth work within the organisation.

Club Support

This year eighty-nine groups affiliated to Young Gloucestershire and over 60 took advantage of the low cost insurance which meets the legal requirements for public liability and employer's liability. Once affiliated, the groups automatically become affiliated to UK Youth and the National Association of Clubs for Young People.

The Roadshow

Despite Foot and Mouth, in total the Roadshow made 104 visits to youth clubs and worked with 2588 young people.

Circus Skills is still the most popular activity the Roadshow has to offer closely followed by creative and team building sessions. The Roadshow was featured on the BBC during the 'Children in Need' night last November with Chantelle, Jackie and Cath taking the van out to North Nibley for a Circus Skills session

Annual Programme

The NACYP Music Quiz attracted 11 clubs comprising of 48 teams to take part this year. Teams from Matson Churches Youth Project went on to the Regional rounds.

This year's scheme involved 21 young people.

The Personal Safety Day covered First Aid, Drug Awareness, Fire Safety in the Home, communication and team-building skills - our thanks go to Sainsburys who donated a voucher towards refreshments and Deep Pan Pizza Co who provided a substantial discount to enable us to provide a pizza lunch. The Taking Care of

Me' evening provided a 'hands-on' look at how to protect themselves at all times. The following evening involved the group visiting Gloucester Fire Station where a combined Fire & Rescue and Ambulance session was held. The two-day residential after some last minute changes due to Foot and Mouth, took place at Pwll Du Adventure Centre, Abergavenny. Activities included Kayaking and Canadian Canoeing along 4.5 miles of the River Wye, Teambuilding and problem solving exercises, awareness workshops on crime: including a Court Room role play. To complete the scheme young people

presented the results of their community projects to family, friends and youth workers on the evening of Wednesday, 23rd May at Gloucester Fire Station, where not only were there static displays, but also video work created by one of the groups and various members of the participants gave a spoken insight to the groups involvement throughout the duration of the Scheme. At the end of the young people's contribution to the evening, Stephen Powers of Young Gloucestershire's Board of Directors presented each young person with a certificate of achievement.

Community Projects

Cheltenham Detached Team, Reddings Area

This group decided to focus on the needs of young people within their area who wished access to a skate park. They set themselves the task of surveying the need and putting plans into action to address young people's wishes with the Council.

Arts

The arts programme offered by Young Gloucestershire is continually growing and changing and now accounts for a high percentage of Roadshow bookings. Jackie McKenzie changed roles from that of Admin Worker for the Youth Development Team to being Arts Development Worker and has since revamped the sessions with great success. We now offer themed creative sessions which are quickly booked up. These have included everything from glass painting to baking Valentine's day biscuits (complete with handmade box!), Easter egg painting and Father's Day cards with detachable 'bad taste' ties. Regular sessions also include marbling and screen-printing. The annual county dance event was opened up to become a festival celebrating all forms of dance and offering free workshops to those keen to take part. Winners could opt to go forward to the UK Youth annual competition. 17 Teams and Pairs took part and dancers from Coady Crew, Brockworth Youth Club and St Peter's School represented the county in the national finals. The 'festival' feel to the event continues in 2001 with Montell's nightclub in Tewkesbury providing the venue. The NACYP Music Quiz is always a huge hit and booked out throughout December and January. The county winners for 2000/2001 were a team from Matson Churches Youth and Community Centre.

Scorcher

These multi-activity days were launched during the summer holidays 2000 in a bid to offer fun-packed physical and creative sessions to young people all over the county.

Eight 'Scorcher' sessions were snapped up by parish councils, neighbourhood projects and youth clubs, particularly in rural areas with few facilities. In total, 186 young people aged 6-14 attended with just £41.11 being spent on materials.

The popularity of these days meant that Scorcher was once again out on the road during the summer holidays this year. The sessions give Roadshow staff, led by Sports Development Worker Chantelle Goddard-Jones, an opportunity to make contact with groups we previously have not worked with and a chance to try out

YG celebrates ten year partnership with the Prince's Trust Volunteers

The year 2000 was the tenth anniversary of Young Gloucestershire's partnership with The Prince's Trust in the delivery of Prince's Trust Volunteers programmes. This was recognised at our AGM in November when Tom Shebbeare, Chief Executive of The Prince's Trust, presented a certificate to celebrate our achievement.

During the year we ran seven teams for 81 young people. Our two employed Team Leaders, Colin Gourlay and Alex Twigg, were supported by Alec Linton and Julian Dickens, seconded from the Police Force; Carol Wheeler seconded from GCHQ and Vicky McDonald seconded from the Army.

The teams undertook projects during their 12-week programmes. They included:

Having been with Young Gloucestershire for five years and having done such a lot to establish the Prince's Trust Volunteers



programmes in the county, Allan Hinton decided to move on and is now with Prospect Training. His successor is Martin Shotbolt who brings new ideas and energy to the project and will build on the foundations Allan established.

Year of significant change for YG's InfoBUZZ project

This has been a year of significant change and challenge for the Infobuzz project. The year started on a 'high' with a successful bid to the NLCB resulting in funding being made available to us tailoring down over a three-year period. This opportunity has allowed us the flexibility to explore sustainable funding streams to ensure a bright future for the project, in addition to being able to appoint a full-time operations manager (Dave Rose) and three part-time posts.


The InfoBUZZ also received a significant contribution from the Local Education Authority to develop new resources for 12 to 15 year-olds in line with the County drug education guidelines. This funding also included support for free input to two whole-year groups in all Gloucestershire Secondary Schools.

However, this enthusiasm was tempered slightly by the departure of Jill Bonner (Project Co-ordinator) in June 2000. It is with some regret that we have had to say goodbye to Jill, but I would like to acknowledge the work she put in while with the project, not least the work that went into the successful NLCB application.

In Jill's absence Tony France was contracted to oversee the project and ensure that contractual obligations were met. Over the summer the team developed a range of new resources for schools including a 'risk room' game, which allowed young people to explore the plethora of risky situations often associated with drugs and develop strategies for coping with them. The team also worked on a development strategy for further promoting the project.

The Co-ordinator's post was advertised in September but, unfortunately, we were unable to appoint due to lack of suitable applicants. Rather than simply re-advertise we booked a residential and undertook to re-define the structure of the project and identify exactly what additional skills were required within the team. Having worked through at length it was felt that the skill most needed was that of a development worker who could identify potential streams of funding and create pilot projects that could later become part of the central InfoBUZZ portfolio. It was decided to wait until after Christmas before advertising.

In the interim period the project undertook a pilot project in HMP Eastwood Park women's prison working with the young offenders. A four-week rolling programme was agreed to run for a six-month period. The group programme focused on drugs, sexual



health, self-esteem and bullying and worked with groups of 8 to 12 young women. The pilot project was highly successful and was evaluated by prison staff, InfoBUZZ and the young people themselves. We now look forward to extending our work in the prison on a more permanent basis.

In terms of youth work the project was involved in a very successful piece of work over a six- week period in Horizons Youth Centre, working with local young people on exploring attitudes to drugs, checking

and acquiring information and developing skills. This was followed by a similar programme in Tewkesbury Youth Centre which resulted in information being produced by the young people about the dangers of having a drink 'spiked' while

After Christmas we advertised for a Development Worker. However, we were once again disappointed in the response and were unable to appoint. The team themselves had spent the majority of the year without a full-time manager and as such had already taken on the day-to-day bookings and administration of the project; this led to a decision being taken to formalise a more co-operative model of management to take us forward into the next financial

The lottery and LEA funding allowed us to work with over 6000 young people in over 50 different environments. The InfoBUZZ continues to go from strength to strength and we look forward to a bright and exciting future.

millennium volunteers

Millennium Volunteers 'build on what they're into'

Millennium Volunteers is a national initiative to encourage more 16 - 24 years olds to volunteer their time for the benefit of others. We promote Millennium Volunteers around the idea of young people gaining an 'MV for your CV'. Our approach is rooted in the concept of young people determining what they want to do. 'Build on what you're into' is designed to empower young people to undertake activities which they care about, using their skills and interests as a starting point. Millennium Volunteers are supported to complete 100 or 200 hours of voluntary activity and on completion receive a nationally recognised award or certificate.

Millennium Volunteers has moved out of Peter Scott House into the Cleeve Suite at Spread Eagle Court, as the projects' success meant that we needed to increase staff. The last year has seen many changes in the department with some staff moving to new pastures, new people joining the team and an evaluation of our roles. This has given us the chance to assess our delivery of the project and to introduce new volunteering opportunities for the benefit of young people who are socially excluded.

One of the new initiatives that we have implemented is National Trust Residentials, where unemployed young people can take part in environmental/conservation

work for a week. The idea behind this week is that the young people can build up a rapport with their MV Project Worker, volunteer whilst having fun and meet new friends, therefore introducing them to the concept of what Millennium Volunteers is all about. The National Trust Residentials are proving to be a real success; we have now attended Nottinghamshire, Exmoor and Derbyshire with the NT and have recruited 45 young people to Millennium Volunteers this way. The weeks have been extremely tiring and challenging but very rewarding. What is New Start Network?

New Start Network is a foundation programme aimed at those young adults who are unable to access current Government programmes, education, training or employment without sustainable support, guidance and personal development. The programme focuses on specific target groups such as exoffenders, lone parents, ethnic minorities, homeless, those with literacy or numeracy needs, disabled people and those living in rural areas. The programme has received ESF funding since 1997 and has helped over 1200 people to date. Individual training programmes are delivered through a network of partners who each have considerable experience of working with disadvantaged young people.





How is it different from any other training programme?

It's flexible - and it needs to be! Many of the young people on the programme lead chaotic lives, with serious barriers preventing them from succeeding in a conventional learning or training environment. Through a network of delivery partners, our young people can receive support and advice to address some of their problems, with individual programmes devised which can fit in with their particular circumstances. Training is provided in a non-threatening environment and our partners are sympathetic and non-judgemental in their approach.

Who can benefit from New Start Network?

Any young person aged between 16-25 who is currently unemployed.

Project Update

Funded through the European Social Fund (ESF), the New Start Network programme has run in the county since 1997. Whilst Young Gloucestershire has notionally been responsible for NSN's delivery since October 2000, in actual fact the contract to run it was not awarded until January 2001 and the project team not recruited until February. Not the best of starts!

Due to the project's late start, a great deal of time and effort has had to be invested to jump start the programme and to build confidence between delivery partners, referral agencies and the young people themselves. The good news is that we are getting there! Our target figures in terms of trainee starts and training delivery hours are showing growth month on month and we are extremely pleased with progress to date.

As at the end of May 2001, the numbers were as follows:



NSN participants at the YMCA in Cheltenham went on a three-day residential with the Army Youth Team based at Chepstow. The course is meant to give an insight into the Army but for these young people it was a chance to try activities, which they have never done before and mix with other groups. Initiative has helped over 500 young people since 1998

Young Gloucestershire became the delivery partner for the 18-24 Voluntary and Environmental Task Force options of New Deal in early 1998. Working with Gloucester City Council and Cheltenham Borough Council as lead bodies, the Employment Service, and the voluntary/community sectors of the county, we have provided work experience placements, training and Jobsearch facilities for over 500 young people coming on to this initiative.

We worked jointly with many local organisations to create a durable structure and effective communications network, which would underpin the opportunities and support for the participants. This was an essential element to successful delivery of this contract and played a significant role in the successful outcomes of many individuals, and to the high job entry rates we experienced in the last year.

Throughout this time the New Deal team at Young Gloucestershire were committed to ongoing improvement to increase the value of this programme for all concerned and, at the end of the first contracted period, felt that substantial improvements had been made in terms of both content and outcomes.

We entered the re-tendering stage with a mixture of anticipation and apprehension but confident that we had proved our commitment and ability to justify becoming direct contract holders. The tendering process itself gave us an opportunity to re-affirm our suitability and outline our development intentions. However, we were unsuccessful and the contract was awarded to a national commercial company.

The team was devastated but resigned themselves to moving on as their individual contracts ended when the New Deal contract expired. All but one of the team has since found employment. The transition of 40 residual participants was managed fairly well although somewhat hastily. I am hopeful that the new providers will continue to work with voluntary and associated organisations that have worked with us in the past, to support and increase the sector's capacity to work with this sometimes very difficult group of young people.

I am clear about what I need to do to progress towards that end result and I am very motivated and confident about being able to do it.'

When Mark Paris joined New Deal he wanted to work as a manager in the retail sector. We arranged his work experience at a charity shop where Mark very quickly proved his ability and commitment. After three months he

He is considering applying to become the shop manager and also a regional relief manager for the Midlands. Mark says 'New Deal really got me back on my feet.
